

## Tents On Hog Back

### A New Recreation Spot In The Carolina Mountains

Visitors to Hogback Mountain Club near Tryon, N. C., are spending a night or more there are now in the new Guests' Camp. Ten tents of the army type have been placed on a reservation near the Club House and betwee two of the golf fairways.

The flooring of these tents rests upon rock foundation which lifts them above the soil and the floors are boxed around the sides, making he interiors perfectly dry even in wet weather.

This tent colony is located near the Clab House so that guests have but a short walk to and from the Club House for meals.

A number of good campers from different cities are putting in applications for week-end quarters during August.

The glof course is nearly completed and tennis courts are ready for use. They are located about one hundred yards from the swimming poor and players may have a plunge in the pool or a shower in the bath house after games.

These courts have been built under the supervision of an expert who given close attention to the drainage and the top soil that covers the drains to a depth of six inches. At last he worked out combination of clays and crushed granite which has been applied. ## RECORDS GREAT **INDUSTRY**

## **Private Initiative Credited** With Notable Progress In the Carolinas

The newspapers and magazines of oday rightly speak of the Electrical South, for in your section has been made the greatest progress of the dectrical industry during the last ive years. inder State and Federal regulation. The Alabama Power Company, leorgia Railway and Power Company, Southern Power Company, Carolina Power and Light Company, which are large dispensers of electricity in their respective States, reoort an aggregate output in 1926 of 3,625,000,000 K. W. H. These same companies in 1920 had an output of 1,866,000,000 K. W. H., indicating 100 per cent infrancing in those five States.

### Decreased Costs

With all this great development felectric power, its average cost has steadilyl decreased since the inception of the industry. In fact, the present average cost of electriity to the American public is less than before the war, while the average cost of all other commodities is 65 per cent higher. Careful management, more effi-

cient generation and transmission, inter-connection, a greater volume of business, and regulation have made this possible. The watchful eye of regulation insists that the capital required by the electric light and power companies for additions to genproximately one billion dollars a year of their savings and capital Ancient titles and mosaics, used into new electric light and power to this day in the decoration of equipment to serve Ameican indust-

## Super-Power Systems

As to the spread and growth of inter-connection or the superpower systems, at present in the United States there is a continuous interconnected system extending from until the late wars, hangs on the Boston through Niagara Falls, Pitts-

Another system connects the water powers of Minnesota and northern Wisconsin through Chicago and Ohio with the great coalburning stations of the Appalachian Power Company in West Virginia. With the exception of a short break between Danville, Virginia, and Roxboro, North Carolina, this system will be complete through the Southern States until it reaches the Gulf at Pensacola.

The prresent inter-connected system in the South begins with the Alabama Power Company at Meridian, Mississippi; Mobile, Alabama; and Pensacola, Florida. Tied on to the east is the Georgia Railway and Power Company which connects, on the north, with the waterplants. at Hailes Bar and the power houses of the Tennesses Electric Power Company along the Upper Tennessee. On the east, this great system connects with the properties of the Southern Power Company, which carry the lines through North and South Carolina, as far as the Virginia border.

An Operating Unit 'Thus the whole Southe becomes an intergrated operating unit, which coordinates the water powers of the Southern Appalachians with the fuel
