Mr. D. C. Stearns and daughter who are visiting in Cleveland Ohio for a few weeks expect to return to Tryon shortly.

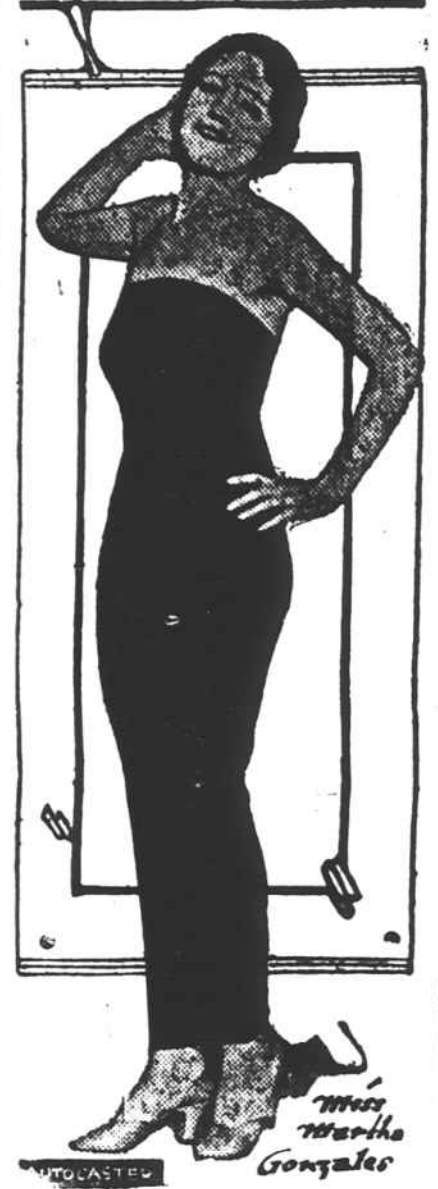

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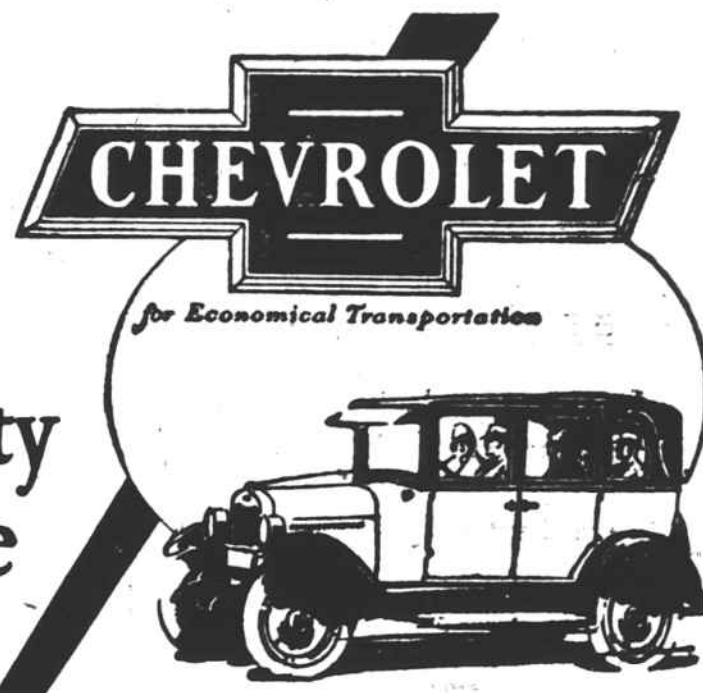
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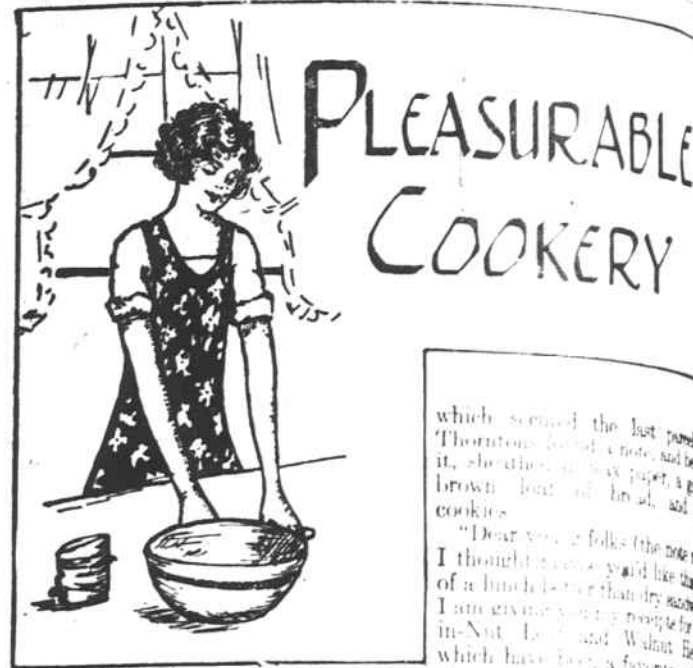
