#### HARD-SURFACED ROADS SAVE CASH

Motorists of the United States save more than \$1,600,000,000 anually in motor vehicle operating costs as a result of the construction, since 1904. of 133,000 miles of hard-surfaced roads and 153,000 miles of gravel roads, said W. H. Connell, president of the American Road Building association

This statement featured the ad-Connell made before the dress organization's convention when it met recently at Raleigh, N. C.

Such a saving in motor vehicle costs for the United States exceeds the annual cost of the improved highways," Connell declared. "In Pennsylvania alone an analysis of operating costs of motor vehicles proved conclusively that the construction of the hard-surfaced roads has saved more than \$32,000,000 annually.

"The annual cost for each mile of hard-surfaced roads constructed in the United States under the federal-aid system is approximately \$8,350, or about \$446,000,000 for the 133,196 miles. For the gravel roads it is about \$2,000 per mile, or \$305,000,000 for the 153,000 miles, making a total of \$751,000,000 annual charge for hardsurface and gravel roads.

The construction of these roads saved the maintenance cost for the 286,000 miles which have been replaced totaling \$143,000,000. Therefore, the additional annual charge due to construction is only \$608,000,000. Deducting this from the saving in operating costs of \$1.630,000,000 leaves a net annual saving of \$1,022,000,000."
