PINEHURST, N. C., Nov. 26.—Golf received another big boost here recently with the announcement of two additional eighteen holes golf courses to be laid out in the Pinehurst district. Donald J. Ross, America's famous golf architect is already at work on one course, while the other will not be started for about eight months.

The two new courses are at Knollwood, four miles from Pinehurst on the road to Southern Pines, and are very near the exclusive Mid-Pines links. This group of three courses, together with the famous four at Southern Pines gives this golf center a total of eight courses, undoubtedly the greatest golf center in the world without a large urban nucleus.

In connection with the new course at Knollwood the Tufts interests of Pinehurst are building a 300-room English Tudor hotel four stories high to help accommodate the unprecedented crowds of winter resort golfers which swamp hotel accommodations here every winter and spring. This will be the largest hotel undertaking in North Carolina since the erection of The Carolina Hotel here thirty years ago.

MIAMI, Fla., Nov. 30.—Professional golfers are looking upon two tempting open tournaments at Miami with more than usual interest. The Miami Open which has been played for the last two years is always the very last open event of the season and for this reason it has become important to the profession and a number of amateurs who feel that they have a chance to win the laurels.

The Miami Open attractive as it is, will not stand alone this year as Miami Beach, in planning to dedicate the new La Gorse Links, has also scheduled an open event while the leading talent is on hand. This will mean that the pro has more than a god chance to pick up an attractive sum should he be out of form in one event or the other. The total sum at stake will be something like \$6,000 for both tournaments.

Just to prove that the hurricane failed to accomplish all of its nefarious work Miami golf courses have blossomed forth as if there had been no storm. All the links of the tropical city are ready and Miami Beach will fire the opening gun with an invitation tournament planned for Dec. 2nd, 3rd and 4th. From this date on Miami will stage at least one tournament a week on the average. This year with 14 golf courses

in use there will be ample room for the golfers to enjoy their favorite pastime at leisure.

Tennis, bowling in the green, water sports, dog racing, horse racing, roque and other outdoor sports will help make the winter program a big and important one.

Just now the golfers are having their innings and Willie Klein, winner of the Miami Open last winter will have some stiff competition. Last year he had to outplay Bobby Jones, Willie Macfarlane, Jannie Farrell, Gene Sarazen, Mike Brady, Leo Diegel, Tommy Armour and many other stars to gain the victory. Miami counts on Walter Hagen playing this time and Bobby Jones may play again with such other stars as Sarazen, Hutchinson, Armour, Hampton, Doyle and Forrester surely on hand.

WOMEN'S CLUBS ACTIVE FORCE IN SHAPING PUBLIC OPINION

The North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs is nearing its quarter of a century birthday, and with its branches is functioning in practically every city and town in the State. It has helped establish educational, cultural, and civic standards from the mountains to the sea. Many requirements that we accept now as part of the regular routine of civic life were first heard of on the club program. Briefly, the Federation's greatest contribution to the State has been as a molder of public opinion. Its members have asked questions; they have been told the answers, and above all have been willing to work patiently for results. Often defeated they have seen each defeat set them a little nearer their goal and this has given club women a sublime courage and today their ideal is to help North Carolina reach spiritual heights.

Altruistic in its purpose, its methods are practical, its principles democratic and from these groups rural and urban, there is going out a power that can hardly be over-estimated in North Carolina's progress.

When North Carolina women were enfranchised in 1920 the members of the old suffrage association knew that politically women had much to learn. Hence the old association almost automatically went into the new organization known as the League of Women Voters. To this organization came also many women who had not been interested in enfranchisement, but with the vote an accomplished fact, they wanted to use it intelligently. Pledged to nonpartisanship, its ob-

jectives have been political education, schools of citizenship, getting out the vote, improved legislation relating to women and children. It publishes a monthly bulletin which has a large number of subscribers and is a means of information on all topics of interest to North Carolina women. This organization makes an especial appeal to college women, who come to it equipped to make its influence effective.

This is among the younger organizations of women, but it has proved that it meets a real need. Organized for the specific purpose of better business women for a better business world, there has been no uncertainty in its program. It is composed of keen, alert women, who have shown its ability in the manner in which it has handled its problems. It has emphasized the fact that better trained women would make for better business. It has insisted on its members being trained for their work, extending a loan-fund to make this possible. Having attained high standards of efficiency, this organization believes that women should receive a certain standard of education based on efficiency and not on the fact that they are women.

"Dynasties are easier to overthrow than prejudices outgrown," has been the motto of this organization. It has shown its credit and high faith in the future. It proved its worth from the beginning. As far as the writer knows, this is the only organization of women financially enough to put its dues high enough at the start to take care of its needs.
