DIRECTOR EXPLAINS SCOPE RESETTLEMENT

Representative of the Resettlement Administration. Those who have failed to qualify for aid from the Farm Credit Administration, or who are threatened with foreclosure and eviction, are considered especially eligible. However, eligibility does not necessarily mean that the applicant will be accepted.

"The local representative of the Resettlement Administration, and his county agricul-

tural or home demonstration agent, will sit down with the applicant and help him to work out a plan for acquiring and operating his land. A county advisory committee will pass on the plan and determine whether it gives reasonable assurance of success. If he is ac-

cepted, the applicant will be advanced funds with which to carry out the plan, and given such guidance as he needs and desires to carry the plan through to completion."
