key for the purpose of sale, the defendant was found guilty and ordered to the roads for 12 months. Judgment was suspended for two years, however, on condition the defendant remain out of the County for said period, and pay a \$15.00 fine and cost. A check given by another party in payment of the fine and cost was found to be no good and a capias was issued for the defendant but could not be served due to the fact that he could not be located.

Pleading guilty on a charge of possessing whiskey for the purpose of sale, Edward Faison was sentenced to six months on the roads. He was allowed to give bond in the sum of \$250.00 for his appearance on October first to begin his sentence.

Freddie Moore pled guilty on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon and received a six-months road sentence. He gave notice of an appeal to Superior Court.

Stanley Moore, who was tried at the March term and convicted on a charge of possessing and transporting whiskey for the purpose of sale and had his sentence suspended under bond for good behavior, was surrendered by his bondsman Monday and was ordered to the roads for 60 days.
