administration, and reviewed the activity of the Democratic party in the keynote address.

The adopted platform, said to have been framed by Hoey leaders, commended the Ehringhaus administration and the sales tax, and pledged farm aid through compact legislation, conservation of highway funds, reduction in automobile licenses, legislation to improve working conditions, a reasonable increase in the school program, and continued cooperation with Roosevelt.

District conventions were held prior to the State convention, with Rivers D. Johnson, Warsaw attorney and former State Senator, presiding over the Third district meeting behind an asbestos curtain on the stage of Memorial Auditorium. The highlight of the district session was the refusal of the delegates to adopt a motion to endorse United States Senators Josiah W. Bailey and Robert R. Reynolds for places as delegates-at-large to the National Convention which opens in Philadelphia next Tuesday; Robert Grady Johnson, Burgaw, Speaker of the House of Representatives during the 1935 session of the General Assembly, led the opposition to the motion, fostered by Paul Webb, Morehead City. The motion was tabled without action.

In the election of officers, Rivers D. Johnson was made permanent chairman; Paul Webb, district vice-president; John T. Wells, Burgaw, secretary; A. D. Ward, New Bern, credentials; N. E. Day, Jacksonville, permanent organization; Col.

John D. Langston, Goldsboro, Composing the Third district executive committee is Luther Hamilton, Morehead City; J. E. Witherington, Vanceboro; Mrs. John D. Robinson, Wallace; Julian K. Warren, Trenton; George A. Walton, Jacksonville; J. T. Wells, Burgaw; William G. King, Clinton; Paul B. Edmundson, Goldsboro; Charles McCotter, Vandemere.
Dr. John D. Robinson, Wallace, was chosen by the State Convention as the presidential elector from the Third district and Mrs. Marshall Williams, Faison, was elected without opposition as one of the nine delegates-at-large to the National Convention. Mrs. Williams was nominated by Richard T. Fountain. Rivers D. Johnson nominated Mrs. E. L. McKee, Sylva, who was also elected.

defendant voluntarily enter the State Hospital for treatment in the inebriate department, and at his own expense.
M. B. Brock, charged with larceny and receiving, was adjudged guilty and received a six-months road sentence.
In the case of Roy James, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, and carrying a concealed weapon, on conclusion of the State's evidence the defendant, through counsel, tendered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to eight months on the roads.
Walter Hart was convicted on a charge of larceny and receiving and drew a six-months road sentence.
In the case of John L. Summerlin, charged with vagrancy, trespass, and public nuisance, the defendant pled incompetency. A jury so found and the defendant was ordered confined in the criminal department of the State Hospital until he recovered his mental capacity then to be remanded to County Court for trial.
M. J. Bowden, charged with public drunkenness and operating an auto while under the influence of whiskey, entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to six months on the roads. Judgment was suspended, however, on payment of a \$50.00 fine and cost and on condition that he remain of good behavior for five years, not drive an auto for one year and forfeit his driver's license. He was ordered to give bond in the sum of \$200 for his appearance at the January and July terms for two years to show compliance.
Herbert Adams was acquitted on a charge of operating an auto while intoxicated and public nuisance.
Enoch Crews, charged with possessing whiskey for the purpose of sale had his motion to dismiss allowed. A non-suit was also allowed in another case in which he was charged with driving an auto without proper license.
In the case of Walter Fennell, charged with driving an auto without proper license, the State took a nol pross with leave. In another case in which he was charged with aiding abetting in transporting whiskey a nol pross was also taken.
Floyd Barnett was acquitted on a charge of assault on a female.
Bryant Carter was adjudged not guilty on a charge of reckless driving.
Herbert Hill, charged with fornication and adultery, entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to 90 days on the roads. Judgment was suspended for two years, however, on

good behavior and payment of the cost.
Pleading guilty to a charge of transporting and possessing whiskey for the purpose of sale and aiding and abetting, Preston Harrell had prayer for judgment continued to the July term.

on the carrying concealed weapons charge. His plea was accepted by the State and he was sentenced to four months on the roads. Sentence was suspended, however, on payment of a \$25.00 fine and cost. The defendant gave notice of an appeal to Superior Court.

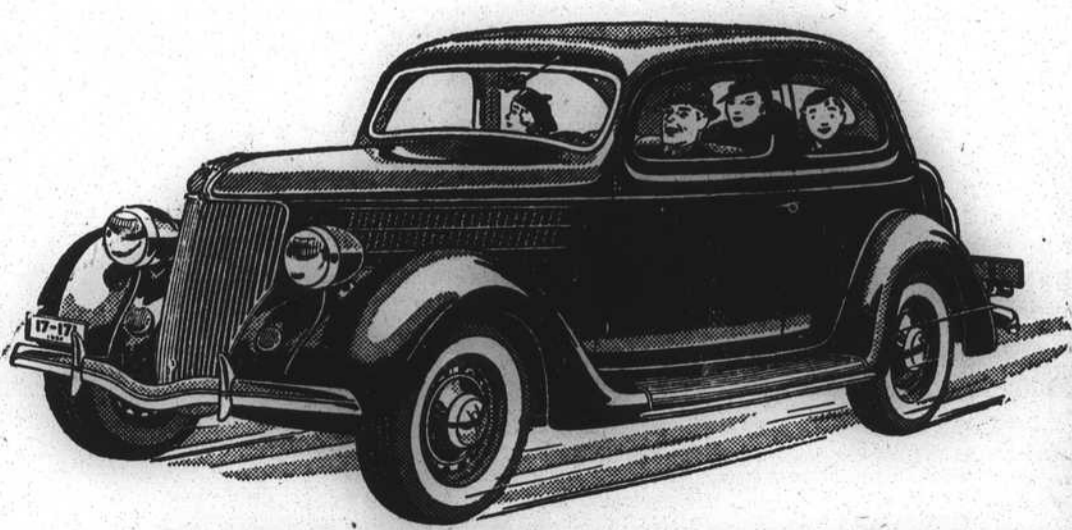
