During the seven-day period just elapsed, hundreds of thousands of pounds of bright yellow weed have been converted into dollars, which have found their way into the pockets of farmers.

Already this season, millions of grades of tobacco have been auctioned off in Whiteville warehouses, and the market each week brings thousands upon thousands of dollars to the farmers of this and outlying territories.

EXPERIMENT FARM CELEBRATION WILL NOTE DEVELOPMENT

(Continued from Page 1) day is aimed at pleasing both men and women, as Miss Pauline Gordon, of the extension service, will stress electrification in relation to home management, and Miss Blythe Burnette, home service director of the Tide Water Power and Light Co., will demonstrate the use of certain electrical appliances. D. E. Jones, another extension worker, will appear in this capacity as a rural electrification specialist. Through the cooperation of Dudley Bagley, Chairman of the North Carolina Rural Electrification Commission, Dr. Dearing added, a demonstration truck exhibiting lighting appliances for country homes will be presented.

Neil M. Smith, Onslow farm agent, has charge of the demonstration features earlier in the day. These demonstrations will be concerned with poultry, horticulture, seed inoculation, insecticides and electrical equipment.

Those taking part in the demonstrations include C. O. Bollinger, state poultryman; J. C. Weaver, State College, Raleigh; R. L. Lovvorn, agronomist in forage crops; Dr. R. W. Leiby, professor of entomology, State College, G. A. Meckstroth, small fruit pathologist, Coastal Plain Experiment Station.

Contests of both an educational and athletic nature will be presented with W. H. Robbins, manager of Penderlea Homesteads, in charge. He will be assisted by Dr. G. K. Middleton, agronomist; E. R. Collins, state experiment station; T. M. Fields, teacher of vocational agriculture in the Clement high school, Wallace; C. V. Morgan, Pender farm agent.

Valuable prizes will be offered for proficiency in answering a series of questions relating to crops under tests at the experiment station, as well as fertility problems. Teams of six students in vocational agriculture classes in this section will compete in a tug-of-war contest, and "barnyard golf", or horseshoe pitching, will complete the contest program.

Worthy of especial mention, it was pointed out, is the fact that the vineyard will be opened to the public.

Prof. Dearstyne will be assisted in this work by C. O. Bollinger, Poultryman of the Coastal Plain Station.

A dairy exhibit featuring the dairy herd of the Coastal Plain Station will be supervised by Dr. C. D. Grinnells, Dairy Experimentalist, and R. T. Caldwell, Dairyman of the Coastal Plain Station. A. D. Stuart of the N. C. Crop Improvement Association is arranging a certified seed exhibit.
