During April, receipts from crops as well as from livestock and livestock products showed increases over April 1936, but the grain from crops was more pronounced than that from livestock items. The South Central States recorded the sharpest advance in income from crops, as cotton prices averaged 22 per cent higher than in April, 1936,

and marketings were larger. In the South Atlantic States, the larger receipts from cotton lint and citrus fruits were important factors in the increased income from crops.
