It is needless to say that she bears her share of Senatorial responsibilities.

In the House of Representatives are a number of active women who merit their voices. It is a far cry from the furore created in 1916 when Montana elected the first women to the National Leg-

But whether serving in public voice at a desk, in the home or on the farm, women are proving their right to assume greater responsibilities and have greater recognition. And the visit of Mrs. Roosevelt to North Carolina, where the First Lady will mingle with Carolina women who are first in the hearts of their communities, is more evidence of the part women have and deserve in our affairs, national, state and local.


