Mr. and Mrs. Roy Boone and baby of Richmond spent the week-end with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Register.

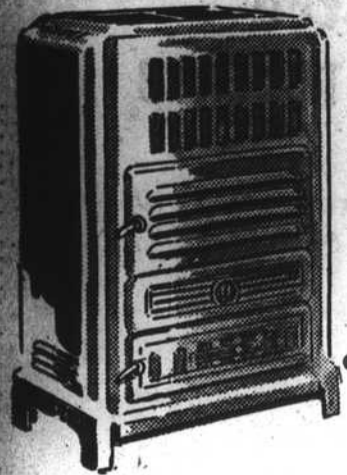
