Vernon Austin of Yakima, Washington, in a ceremony solemnized at eight o'clock Saturday evening at the Methodist church. The church was decorated with Kenia Palms, Wood Wardia Ferns, Clibotums and Southern Smilax; interspersed with candles in tall white seven branched candelabra. Family pews were marked with white flowers tied with white satin ribbons. The Rev. Charles T. Rogers, pastor of the church, was the officiating minister, and wedding music was furnished by Mrs. Edward Stallings, pianist, Mr. Stallings, violinist, of Wilson, N. C., and Mr. Robert W. Fields, vocalist.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a gown of white duchess satin, fashioned with fitted bodice, round neckline. The club hymn was sung at the close of the meeting. Twenty members were present.

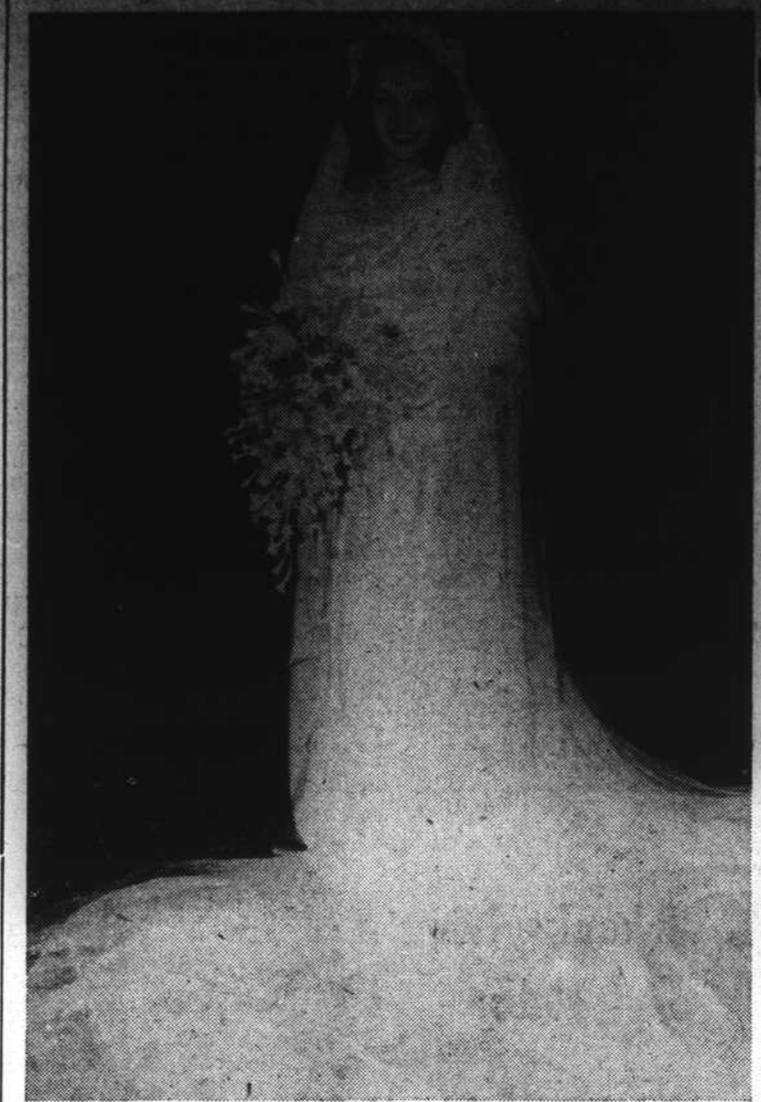
BIRTHDAY PARTY
