(Continued From Page One) local government is being operated.

He spoke on the three branches of government under which the country operates. He pointed out that the grand jurors were serving as members of the judicial branch, and expressed the hope that they may, some day, come in closer contact with the legislative and executive divisions.

He touched upon freedoms guaranteed Americans in the bill of rights. In connection with freedom of speech and freedom of the press he remarked that these liberties should not be allowed to become the instruments whereby all freedoms are destroyed. Communism is attempting to become enrooted here, he said, by use of the press and verbal propaganda. He suggested that it should be a felonious crime for persons to attempt to undermine the democratic foundations of America.

In remarking on the various offices the jurors should visit Judge Stevens asked if Carteret county had a county home. He was told the home was done away with about four years ago.

"We did the same fool trick in my county," declared the judge, "and I'm sorry." He remarked that the idea in his locality was to "farm out" the old folks, in various homes, a system which doesn't work, he continued, because they are not taken care of as they should be. "It can't be done on \$30 a month," the judge concluded, "I'm going to keep after them at home until they build a new one. I hope you get one here."

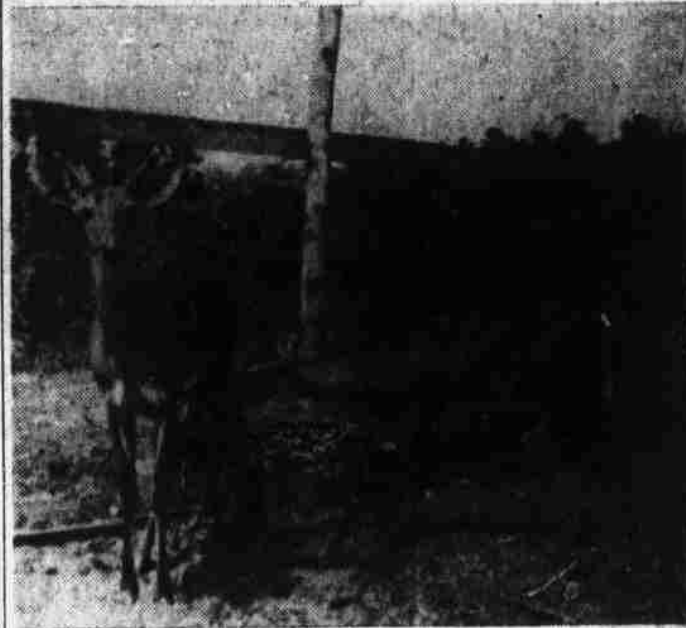
Mr. and Mrs. Sam Pate Entertain at Party

Baby Deer Bring Fame To Newport

On May 21 it happened. 'Mose' Howard's doe gave birth to not one, but two babies, a buck and a doe.

Since their birth in the wire enclosure just west of Mr. Howard's garage at Newport, people have come from as far as Goldsboro to see them.

Although deer have been known to have young ones in captivity, it requires a lot of understanding on the part of their keeper to provide the proper habitat and food so they will survive.

Mr. Howard, who has had the mother and father of the two young ones for two years had a feeling about about the middle of the winter that there would be babies, or at least a baby in the spring. Period of gestation for deer is 7 months and 12 days.

"She's some kind of foolish over those babies," says Mr. Howard, and what mother wouldn't be, for they are the cutest, prettiest, most lovable pair of twins anyone would want to lay eyes on. Their auburn "fur" is studded with tufts of white that march in white slots right down their backs.

Early in the morning before many people are about, Mr. Howard says the babies will frolic and play together like puppies. Although both their mother and father are very tame, Mr. Howard put the father in a separate enclosure for about two weeks so that he would not harm the babies. He gets kind of "skittish" sometimes, Mr. Howard used to have the older couple at his home where his children played with them quite frequently.

When their owner first went in the pen and picked up one of the newborn babies, the mother jumped on his back, fearful that he was going to take the little one away, but since then, Mr. Howard handles them as he pleases, the only reaction on the part of their mother is to wash them through-
