Three Rivers Discovered MOSCOW--(AP)--Three heretofore unknown rivers have been discovered in Siberia. A Tass dispatch from Leningrad related how an expedition of scientists headed by Prof. A. A. Fedorov, of the Botanical Institute of Sciences, penetrated 700 kilometers of Siberian forest trails to find the rivers. They were all in the little explored central mountain range of the Sayansky mountains. In addition to the rivers the scientists found four large glaciers and several large and deep lakes rich in fish.
