over alone. Ask them how mud feels. I'm not asking this person to believe statements made by me. I give him the citizens of Merrimon Township and anyone else who tried to use our road during November and early December to interview, I regret that he wasn't with me on December 5th. He may have registered a cause for complaint.

We in Merrimon do not mean to criticize anyone wrongly. We are not trying to start an argument with anyone. But when an only road is closed for days on end--closed to everything except a school bus for a few more--and when our food, our fuel oil, our jobs are largely dependent on this road, we do feel that we aren't over-riding any lesson in ethics to complain.

AND something has brought results. Mr. Clark, Mr. Spruill, and Mr. Cutchin have visited here. Rails have been placed under the worst spots. The dirt "which couldn't be pulled to one side because so much would be lost" has been pulled over. Drains, dozens of them, have been made. Sand and rock have been hauled. One may go over now. I got stuck only once on my second trip out in two months, and that was because a load of dirt had been dumped and left, and I had no shovel along to level it.

If I have offended anyone wrongfully, I'm sorry. I am not dealing with personalities. I am only appealing for what every isolated taxpayer wants--a road. Until we get one I'm going to keep right on begging and hoping and with no apologies for any bare truth I happen to state. I'm sorry if such truths hurt anyone, but I do not believe in pretense of any sort.
