Wise Waste—1949 Resolution:
 To throw away sometimes is thrifter than to save, household management specialists say. They explain that some articles, likely to accumulate around the house, are accident hazards which should be discarded promptly.

Any chipped or cracked glass ware—whether tumbler, canning jar, cooking or serving dish—should be retired from use to prevent cuts as well as possible waste of food. Chipped enamelware also should go out of kitchen service because it may leave tiny glasslike particles in food prepared or cooked in it. Once china or pottery is cracked or chipped, it cannot be kept sanitary by ordinary dish washing. A cracked cup, therefore, is a health hazard as well as an accident hazard.

Tipsy pots and pans have caused many a serious burn. Cooking utensils should stand steady on the stove.

Home medicine cabinets are likely to fill up. Old pills, prescriptions and remedies are a nuisance and are dangerous to have around. They should never be saved for future use except on specific instructions from the physician. Some drugs deteriorate with age.

Other items which may wisely go out are toys with sharp points or edges or any loose parts which a child can get into his mouth. Toys also have proved dangerous for young children. If they cannot be fixed for safety, it pays to throw it away.

Finally, be sure not to throw items on trash heap or into open containers where children can find them.

Poison Aids Thieves

Farmer Grows Pork By Acre

COLLEGE STATION, Raleigh — Pork is generally measured in terms of pounds or number of hogs, but a Tyrrell county farmer, R. L. Spruill of Columbia, Route 1, says he grows it "by the acre."

His method, according to County Agent H. H. Harris of the State College Extension service, is to let hogs do his corn harvesting, a job at which they seem to be pretty efficient.

Mr. Spruill planted three acres of corn in one field last spring, and by August he estimated the crop would yield 66 bushels per acre. He decided to run a hogging-off demonstration.

On August 19, a total of 27 pigs weighing 2,862 pounds were turned on the field. For 67 days they went about eating all the corn they wanted.

By October 25, the pigs had added 2,688 pounds and weighed a total of 5,550 pounds. Thus, Mr. Spruill figures he produced an average of 896 pounds of pork per acre.

At \$1.25 a bushel, the estimated corn yield from the three acres would have brought \$247.50. Mr. Spruill spent \$64.80 for 1200 pounds of supplement and \$3 for 30 pounds of mineral to feed the pigs. In other words, the corn, supplement and mineral cost \$315.30.

The hogs sold for 25.5 cents per pound. The 2,688 pounds added during the demonstration thus brought a return of \$685.44, and the net profit from the hogging-off was \$370.14.

Two other facts were observed. First, Mr. Spruill made a profit of \$5.52 per day just by watering and caring for the pigs. Second, considering the hogs as harvesters and marketers of corn, Mr. Spruill was able to realize a return of \$125.05 per acre above feed cost, in addition to saving the expense of harvesting the corn.

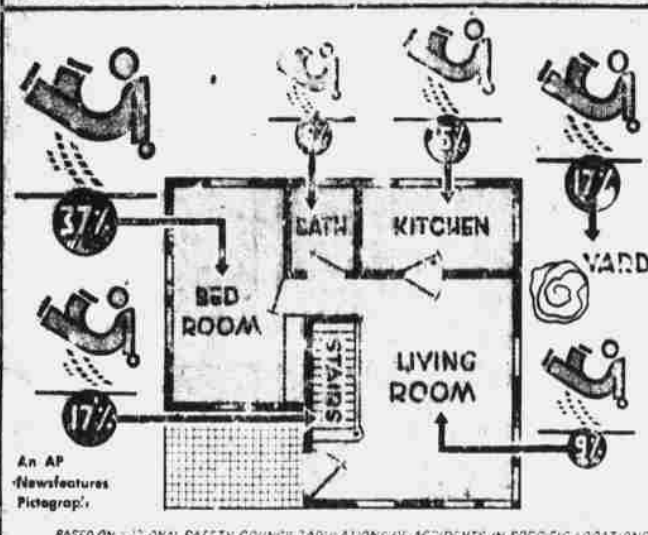
