"Accordingly, it will be recognized that the respondent cease and desist from interfering with or supporting the association and from recognizing the association in less than until it is certified by the board (NLRB) as the representative of the National Federation of Laborers and Allied Industries of the United States and determine to which, if any, union the workers are to be organized and the Carters Landing and Felt Employees' association.

The heavy equipment and garrison personnel of the Wing departed Morehead City via ship, last week, and the passengers lying out of Cherry Point today are aviation specialists, such as mechanics, radiomen, ordnancemen and trouble shooters. In all, the Second Marine Air Wing will have over three thousand men and three hundred aircraft on the Express.
