H. L. Joslyn, School Official, Speaks to Business Women's Club

H. L. Joslyn, superintendent of Carteret county schools, spoke to members of the Business and Professional Women's club at their March meeting Tuesday night in the Ann Street Educational building, Beaufort.
His topic was education in North Carolina. He discussed the recommendations for the state's public school system as made by the State Education commission. The commission requested \$220 million for the 1949 biennium for the "foundation program."
This amount was cut to \$83 by the budget commission whereupon the foundation program was revised to call for \$93 million, Mr. Joslyn stated.
Under the foundation program, which he termed "fundamentally sound" the state would pay 85 per cent of school expenses and counties 15 per cent, according to the ability of the counties to pay for an education program.
This ability would be based on retail sales in the county, value of farm products, assessed valuation of public utilities, and the number of persons employed in the county.
In Carteret's case, the state would pay \$524,648 and the county \$47,014. Richer counties, however, protested against this setup, the speaker explained.
He then outlined the major needs in North Carolina's schools: more teachers (Carteret needs 12 more to reduce the number of pupils for each instructor), more vocational teachers, librarians, a school supervisor, truant officers, music and art teachers, more clerical help.
In Carteret county there are now 31 teachers with sub-standard certificates, the superintendent reported, "and some of these are doing an excellent job," he added.
He then enumerated the specific amounts which would be spent here under the foundation program: \$435,825 for instruction; \$4,358 sick leave for teachers; \$52,150 current expenses; \$62,075 capital outlay, and \$6,240 administrative expense.
Sen. D. L. Ward introduced a bill calling for \$50 million for capital outlay which has passed the Senate and probably will pass in the House, said Mr. Joslyn. "I hope the people will approve this bill and when they do, I don't know whether I want to be superintendent or not. One community will come rushing to my office and say 'You've got to build a school where we live just the way we want it,' and then another group will follow them, saying 'I hear you're going to build a school at such and such a place, you can't do that, you've got to build it where we live'."
The state says, "Consolidate!" continued the school official, "and we've got to do it because the children can be given so many more advantages in a large rather
