Morehead City Garment Co. Workers Will Vote on Union Next Monday

E. W. Witt of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, CIO, today issued a protest against the Morehead City Garment company for "interfering with the rights of its employees."

The complaint stems from the ction of one of the factory supervisor's snatching union-distributed leaflets from workers as they en-tered the plant, Mr. Witt explained. That is a violation of individual

Mr. Witt also announced that an election will be held near the garment company from 6 a. m. to 8 a. m. Monday morning, Oct. 17.
