alive a multi-million-dollar industry for the underworld throughout the country.

The present law against interstate transportation of slot machines, we decided, should be extended to include the other gambling devices on which individual racketeers and organized crime syndicates thrive — punchboards, roulette wheels and so forth. We noted that "the lowly punchboard has attained the proportion of a major racketeering enterprise."

We asked that penalties be increased against the illegal distribution and smuggling of narcotics, that immigration laws be amended to facilitate deportation of undesirable aliens, including criminals, and to provide punishment for smuggling, concealing or harboring illegal aliens.

A bill which the committee recommended is designed to prevent racketeering elements from entering the wholesale liquor industry and to eliminate such elements now entrenched in it. The bill would require liquor distributors to secure yearly renewals of their federal licenses.

On the community level, we encouraged the creation of more state and local crime commissions — which, where they are set up, have achieved effective results — more local racket investigations by unhampered grand juries, and the clearing up of jurisdictional arguments between local law-enforcement officers, which usually result in the law-breaker escaping all punishment.

The answer to the Costellos and the crooked officers and public officials lie in these recommendations. There will be powerful opposition, not only from the national crime syndicate, whose financial and political resources are powerful. There will be a passive opposition, too, from the natural inertia that operates against any far-reaching program of social reform. But, with the help of the people, these bills will provide the ammunition for the war against organized crime in America.
