OBITUARIES

R. L. HUMBER, SR. Robert Lee Humber, sr., 57, of Greenville, father of Robert Lee Humber, jr., of Greenville and Davis, died Monday in Pitt Memorial hospital after a short illness. Funeral services were conducted at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning in Jarvis Memorial Methodist church. Burial was in Cherry Hill cemetery. Mr. Humber, son of the late Oliver Perry and Julia Easterland Humber, was the oldest male native-born Greenville citizen at the time of his death. He spent nearly all his life there and was engaged as a young man in the buggy manufacturing business with his father. In 1880 he established the R. L. Humber Machine Works which he has operated continuously since that time. He introduced baseball in Greenville and organized the first baseball team there in 1880. Mr. Humber was an active member of Jarvis Memorial Methodist church and had served as a member of the board of stewards, as trustee and as clerk of the church. He had also served as a member of the Water and Light commission. He was a member of Greenville Masonic lodge. His wife, Mrs. Lena Davis Humber, died in 1936. Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Lindsey D. Smith of San Francisco, Calif.; two sons, Dr. John D. Humber of San Francisco and Dr. Robert Lee Humber, three sisters, Mrs. Julia A. Mann of Charlotte, Mrs. W. P. White, sr., of Hobgood, and Mrs. Flossie Wedmore of Richmond, Va.

Portion of Waterway Will Close Wednesday, Aug. 20

The office of Army engineers, Wilmington, has announced that the inland waterway between New river and Brown's inlet, N. C., will be closed to all navigation from 9 a. m. to 3 a. m. EST Wednesday, Aug. 20, 1952. Col. R. C. Brown, district engineer, asks that shippers or travelers by water arrange their schedules accordingly. Marine corps craft will be stationed at the terminals of the closed section to warn boats away from the closed portion.

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
