Third Tourist Aid Workshop Set March 3

Wilmington—The third of a series of State-wide workshop clinics being held by the Department of Conservation and Development's State Tourist Bureau to aid the tourist industry to do a better overall job will be held here Wednesday, March 3.
The tourist workshop clinic is sponsored by the Wilmington Chamber of Commerce, the Southeastern North Carolina Beach Association, and the Wilmington Merchants Association. It will precede by five days the third annual tourist training program to be held here at Wilmington College under sponsorship of the Wilmington Merchants Association and Wilmington College's Distributive Education Department.

C & D Director Ben E. Douglas said the clinic will present specialists from the various fields of the State's multi-million dollar tourist industry, and that it will be aimed primarily at management. Tourist industry employees, who are urged to attend the clinic to be held at 2 p.m. in the Community Center, will benefit from what they hear, Douglas added.

Fred Whitaker, manager of the C & D Department's Tourist Bureau, organized the clinic and will present the following speakers on the program: Commissioner Edward Scheidt of the State Department of Motor Vehicles; T. E. Pickard of Charlotte, vice president and general manager, Carolina Motor Club; Marley M. Melvin, Raleigh, executive vice president, N. C. Association of Quality Restaurants; C. F. Dority, Goldsboro, executive secretary, N. C. Service Station Association; and Thompson Greenwood, Raleigh, executive secretary, N. C. Merchants Association.

Douglas will summarize the discussions and preside at a question and answer period climaxing the meeting. The public is invited.

Robert Rouse First to File For Solicitor

On Wednesday Robert D. Rouse Jr., Farmville attorney, became the first to file officially with the State Board of Elections for the Office of solicitor in the Fifth Judicial District in the May primaries. He is a candidate for the Democratic nomination.

In filing Mr. Rouse made this statement: "One of the finest opportunities for public service today is in the maintenance of the faith of our people in the administration of justice in our courts. The solicitor by planning his trial dockets and by preparing his cases carefully can save the people a great deal of time and expense in attending court as witnesses and as jurors. These things I promise to do."

Mr. Rouse is a veteran of World War II, having served in the Navy as a lieutenant (j.g.) while in service he participated in the Normandy invasion. He has been engaged in the practice of law with John B. Lewis in Farmville since graduating from the University of North Carolina Law School in 1949. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert D. Rouse of Farmville and is married to the former Letha Holman of Farmville. They have one son.

He has served as Commander of the Farmville American Legion and as President of the Farmville Junior Chamber of Commerce. He is a past vice-president of the North Carolina Junior Chamber of Commerce. In 1950 he received the Distinguished Service Award. Currently he is serving as a member of the Board of Commissioners.

He is a Mason and a Rotarian. An active member of the Farmville Christian Church, he has served as a Sunday school teacher and as superintendent of the Sunday School and as a member of the Board of Deacons.
