Old Passport Causes Trouble

Hong Kong (AP) — When 73-year-old Yugoslav priest, Francis Alex Benigar, was expelled from China recently he presented a problem to American priest, Paul J. Duchesne, who met him at the Hong Kong border.

There was a bit of difficulty about Father Benigar's ancient passport. He went into China 30 years ago and has been there ever since. His Yugoslav passport, issued by King Alexander I (1921-34), was so out-of-date and battered the customs guards were suspicious. Suspicion was allayed after lingual detours.

Father Benigar speaks seven languages—Yugoslav, Polish, Russian, German, Chinese Mandarin, Italian and Latin. Father Duchesne speaks four, English, French, Chinese Cantonese (which has no similarity to Chinese Mandarin) and Latin.

The old passport was explained in the language of the Caesars to Duchesne in an English to the border guards.
