Beach Board

one of the first to be put in.

H. M. Eure, clerk, gave the board a financial report which stated that 68.5 per cent of the taxes had been collected during the first nine months of the fiscal year. The board felt the town was in satisfactory financial condition.

Mr. Eure reported that the state wanted a detailed survey of the paving work required if the beach intended to use Powell funds and have the state do the work. Feeling that the survey would be too costly, the board decided to take no action but authorized the mayor to proceed with having work done by a private contractor.

Mayor Cooper said that all roads will be put "in first class condition" and Durham avenue from Atlantic Ave., to Fort Macon road will be paved. He said the work would cost \$1,566.25. Powell funds available amount to \$2,386.

Sidewalks around the Atlantic Beach Hotel will also be fixed.

Because the Carolina Telephone Co. franchise is to expire soon, a new franchise was read to the board. Law requires a second reading at the next board meeting.

The mayor reported that Carolina Power and Light informed Mr. Eure that their tax assessment at the beach was too small in view of the improvements that had been made and they have paid a tax "about 50 times that which was originally charged," the mayor said. The board agreed that the action was most unusual and was appreciated.

The commissioners requested that the mayor contact George Franklin of the League of Municipalities and have him come to the beach as soon as possible to discuss facilities for fire fighting. Commissioner Carl Lanier also suggested that when a plan is worked out that the property owners be told of the proposal at a general town meeting.

Mayor Cooper said he would also like Mr. Franklin to give advice on zoning the beach.

The board approved installation of a two-way police radio in the car of the chief of police, George Smith. The cost will be \$590 plus \$100 a year maintenance. The radio will be on the same frequency as the other police cars in the county.

The chief of police reported that he had patrolled cottages through the winter and mailed reports regularly to cottage owners. Cottages at Ocean Ridge were also patrolled at a charge of \$800 which was made by the town. The time agreed on for patrolling has expired and the board authorized Chief Smith to continue but asked that the clerk notify George L. H. White, Raleigh, that the patrolling will cease unless further arrangements are made.

The mayor said that the chief has filed for constable of Morehead township. The board said that if he is elected, he could continue to work at the beach providing his elective job did not interfere with duties at the beach.

The mayor was authorized to request the state to grant easement for parking on either side of the causeway leading to the bridge. The schedule for collecting business licenses was approved with the stipulation that complaints, if any, will be heard by the board at a subsequent meeting.

The clerk and the chief of police were authorized to make the collections.

The chief was advised, in regard to the dog problem, to try to locate owners of dogs, and if they can't be found, the dog should be destroyed.

Commissioners Carl Lanier, L. T. White and Hob Anderson were present. Commissioner W. C. Whitehurst did not attend.
