Montreal (AP) — Eskimo children in Canada's northland are in for a treat. Rt. Rev. Donald B. Marsh, Anglican bishop of the Arctic, is visiting them soon, and he's taking the first of some 2,500 toys to be distributed among the young-

Bishop Marsh, who can handle a dog team and speak fluent Eskimo, is flying from Montreal on the first leg of a 16,000-mile tour of his vast

diocese.

The toys came from the Montreal Boy Scouts Association. He is taking just a few; the rest will arrive later by bush planes.

"Eskimo children, like children everywhere, love to play," he says.

"The little girls tie up bundles of rags to use as 'dolls' while the boys play with ministure sleds and spears as they go on imaginary hunting expeditions."

They now will have toy trucks, tractors, real dolls and all kinds of games. Most Eskimo boys have seen planes, tractors and trucks, and they will be happy to play with ministure versions of these worders from the white man's world, the bishop says.






