(3) A license of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) on each packer, shucker, and canner of oysters. Each such packer, shucker, and canner is required to contribute fifty per cent of the oyster shells he accumulates annually for planting on public beds.

(4) The Commissioner of Commercial Fisheries or the Assistant Commissioner shall collect the said licenses, taxes, and fees herein imposed shall be effective from and after January 1, 1954.
