Fastidious ladies who debate the relative merits of various leg hair removal methods sometimes forget their arms. It isn't that they mean to neglect them, it's just that they don't think of it.

Arm hair may be removed in exactly the same fashion employed on legs. Or it may be lightened satisfactorily if the growth is not too heavy.

Think Ahead of Baby's Needs When Attending Baby Shower

A baby shower on the calendar for an expectant mother in your neighborhood? Then try a new idea — give her a baby-food party.

so she won't be deluged with frilly miniature garments the newcomer will swiftly outgrow.

Ask each person coming to the party to think ahead of Baby's needs when he arrives in this wide and wonderful world. Some of the guests can bring starting cereals, cans of strained orange juice and strained meats; other guests can bring cans or jars of strained vegetables and fruits. Eight-ounce bottles for formula and 4-ounce bottles for orange juice and water might also be included.

If each guest puts a sticker on the container of baby food she brings, and adds the date and her own name, the guest of honor will enjoy the remainder when she feeds Baby.

Other useful shower gifts along the feeding line are a small silver spoon, a baby dish and mug, and sterilizing equipment for formula. And how about something for Mother herself? Why not a colorful smock or bed jacket to wear when she's giving Baby his meals?

If party funds permit, present the shower gifts in a real bassinet, sized for early sleeping needs and baby totting, both at home and outdoors. The bassinet can take on a party air with a wide ruffle of crepe paper.

To make the bassinet ruffle, cut a strip of pink or blue crepe paper as deep as the bassinet, plus 3 inches to extend over the top. Be sure that the paper is long enough to go around the basket three times. Gather the paper on one edge to form the top ruffle, then attach it to the bassinet with thumb tacks. Decorate the ruffled bassinet with a wide pink or blue satin ribbon bow and sprays of pink or blue flowers, choosing the color of the flowers to contrast with the bow.

Of course your shower guests have to be fed. Favorite kinds of sandwiches and coffee, with olives and nuts, are a good bet. For dessert, why not carry out the baby-food theme? Here is a recipe for a baby-food ice cream, and one for a baby-food sherbet. Put a scoop of each kind on each serving, and pass with small cup cakes or fancy cookies. Tastes good, and everyone will enjoy the variety.

Ingredients: ¼ cup sugar, 1 cup strained apricots with farina, ¼ cup strained banana pudding, ¼

cup undiluted evaporated milk (chilled).

Method: Beat sugar, apricots with farina and banana pudding together with rotary beater (hand or electric) until blended. Whip chilled evaporated milk until thick; fold into fruit mixture. Freeze, stirring occasionally until firm. (Have refrigerator temperature control at coldest setting).

Baby Food Sherbet

Ingredients: 1 cup strained plums with tapioca, ¼ cup cherry juice (drained from a No. 2 can pitted red sour cherries), ¼ teaspoon almond extract, ¼ cup sugar, 2 egg whites (stiffly beaten).

Method: Mix strained plums with tapioca, cherry juice, almond extract and sugar. Fold in beaten egg whites. Pour into a freezer tray and partially freeze. (Have refrigerator at coldest setting). Remove to a chilled bowl and beat until smooth but not melted. Return to freezer and freeze until firm.

The baby food ice cream and baby food sherbet, served together, will make about 10 portions.
