## Station Gets New Commander

Ocracoke — Chief Boatswain Dewey H. Scarborough, USCG, has relieved Chief Boatswain Henry T. Peele, USCG, as commander of the Coast Guard's Ocracoke Group and commanding officer of the Ocracoke Lightboat Station.

The group includes the Hatteras Inlet Lifeboat Station and the Ocracoke Light Station.

Peele, who has been at Ocracoke since October 1948, and is a native of Hatteras, has been named commanding officer of the Little Creek, Va., Lifeboat Station.

Before his assignment to Ocracoke, Scarborough was serving as commanding officer of the Coast Guard's Chesapeake Lightship. He earlier commanded the Ocracoke Island 83-foot patrol boat, CG-83-483.

Scarborough was born in Avon in 1919, and 20 years later enlisted in the Coast Guard as a seaman, serving first aboard the old cutter Modoc.

Peele was born in 1907 and joined the Coast Guard as a junior at the old Fire Island Lifeboat Station in 1928. He served at the Coast Guard Air Station, Elizabeth City, prior to his Ocracoke assignment in 1949.

## 24 Complete Cotton Course

A group of 24 cotton industry representatives from four states completed a two-week Cotton Classification Short Course at the Morehead City Technical Institute Friday and received certificates from North Carolina State College.

The course was sponsored by the State College School of Textiles and Extension Division and was taught by Joe Trewbridge of Goldsboro, cotton buyer for Borden Mills and F.W. G. Best Manager of the School of Textiles at State College.

Certificates were presented to the graduates of the course by Director Edward W. Ruggles of the college's Extension Division.

Among those attending the short course were cotton ginners, buyers, classes, and cotton mill officials from North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, and Georgia. The program of instruction was devoted to the grading and stapling of cotton Government grading standards, and cotton quality.

Hog raisers of this area who can market their hogs during the next two months will get higher prices than they will in the fall, predicts R. M. Williams, county agent.

The state crop reporting service has indicated that the spring pig population was the second largest on record, said Mr. Williams. Pigs now being prepared for market in the state total over a million head, which is nine per cent above last spring's crop of pigs, he said.

With a pig crop increase coming up this fall the supply will be able to meet the demand and therefore prices will be lower in the fall than during the next two months.
