Architect Draws Plans For Two School Additions

B. H. Stephens, Beaufort architect, is drawing plans now for additions to the Queen Street and Beaufort Schools, H. L. Joslyn, county superintendent of schools, reported yesterday.

The Queen Street School will be getting additional classroom space with an annex and an elementary school will be added to Beaufort School.

After the blue prints are drawn, bids will be called for. The additions are being financed through the bond revenue approved by the people of North Carolina last fall.

Fort Macon Leads In Park Attendance

Fort Macon State Park is currently leading all other state parks in North Carolina in attendance with a mark of 313,779 visitors thus far this season, according to State Parks Superintendent Thomas W. Morse.

For the first six months of the season, the total attendance is 708,232 in 11 of North Carolina's 15 state parks.

Morrow Mountain in Stanly County is in second place, far behind Fort Macon with 96,890 visitors in the first six months. Mount Mitchell has had 85,456 visitors and Hanging Rock has an attendance mark of 74,706.

Blow-Out Causes \$200 Damage to Car

Equipment Quirks Delay Signal Light Operation

The traffic lights in downtown Morehead City will go into operation as soon as the electrical equipment is in working order.

D. G. Bell, police commissioner, said that signs reading "No Left Turn" will also be put up at the intersections from 7th to 9th Streets. Not all of those signs have arrived as yet.

While the no left regulation may cause some confusion at first, he said it is the only way to prevent traffic snarls. Traffic will be diverted to Evans and Bridges Streets.

The signal lights have been installed at a cost of \$5,000.
