## Ask for \$100,000

Miss Gertrude Carroway, D. L. Ward, and Hugh Mills appeared before the board to request \$100,000 for continuing the program of reconstructing Tryon Palace. The matter was referred to the Parks Commission by Governor Umstead.

Lewis Hardy, Southport, asked the board to reinstate the reciprocal agreement with Florida shrimp

ers. He said that the agreement was in effect for the past five years but isn't effective this year. He also requested that a study be made of the pollution of the waters of North Carolina by several industries. He said that it seems the industries have had some effect on the fish and he believes it might be caused by waste products being emptied in the water of the Southport area.

Governor Umstead referred Mr. Hardy to the Commercial Fisheries Division and the Water Resources, Inlets and Coastal Waterways Division.

Col. J. C. Cooper, chairman of the Kerr Reservoir Development Commission, recommended that the board get a lease from the U. S. government for that portion of the reservoir which is unleased. He was referred to the Parks Commission.

The Advertising Commission and Water Resources Commission will meet at 9 a.m. today and the Commerce and Industry Commission and the Forestry Commission will meet at 2 p.m. today.

W. K. Taylor moved that the board accept the proposal and R. P. Wood seconded. The motion passed. The town board then passed a motion to go through with the proposal.

Colonel Joyner appeared to get a cross-section of opinion concerning a project to get a community chapel at Atlantic Beach.

Colonel Joyner said that the beach needed such a chapel so that people could attend church while on their vacation. He also said that it was important that children attend Sunday School while on vacation because it was easy for them to break the habit of attending.

He said that the church would be governed by a board representing every denomination.

Hob Anderson, commissioner, suggested that the board go on record approving the community chapel. His suggestion was approved in the form of a resolution.

S. A. Horton presented a franchise to control the water properties of Atlantic Beach for 17 years and the franchise was given the first reading by H. M. Eure, clerk of the board. The second reading will take place at the next meeting of the board.

Charlie Roberts and Sam Guthrie, who operate a rides concession at Atlantic Beach, asked that they be allowed to stay open later at night.

Mr. Guthrie pointed out that they were slow getting their equipment set up and they have had trouble making expenses with "such short hours."

Mayor Cooper informed the board that he had received a letter from George Franklin, attorney for the North Carolina League of Municipalities, concerning the correct procedure to follow in annexing territory.

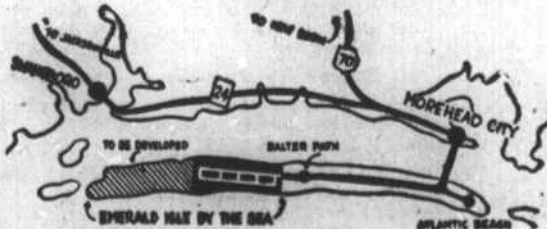
