# Firemen See Demonstration

Sixteen Newport firemen recently attended a fire extinguisher demonstration in Newport presented by Lloyd N. Garner, Cherry Point Fire Department lieutenant. Six different types of extinguish-ers were explained and demon-strated in the special meeting, part of the summer training for New-port firemen, at the Newport Fire Station. Cut-away models of sodaacid, foam and carbon dioxide ex-tinguishers were used during the

demonstration.

Three "model" fires were built and members of the department had a chance to use the various types of chemical on the fires. One fire was a Class A or wood fire.
