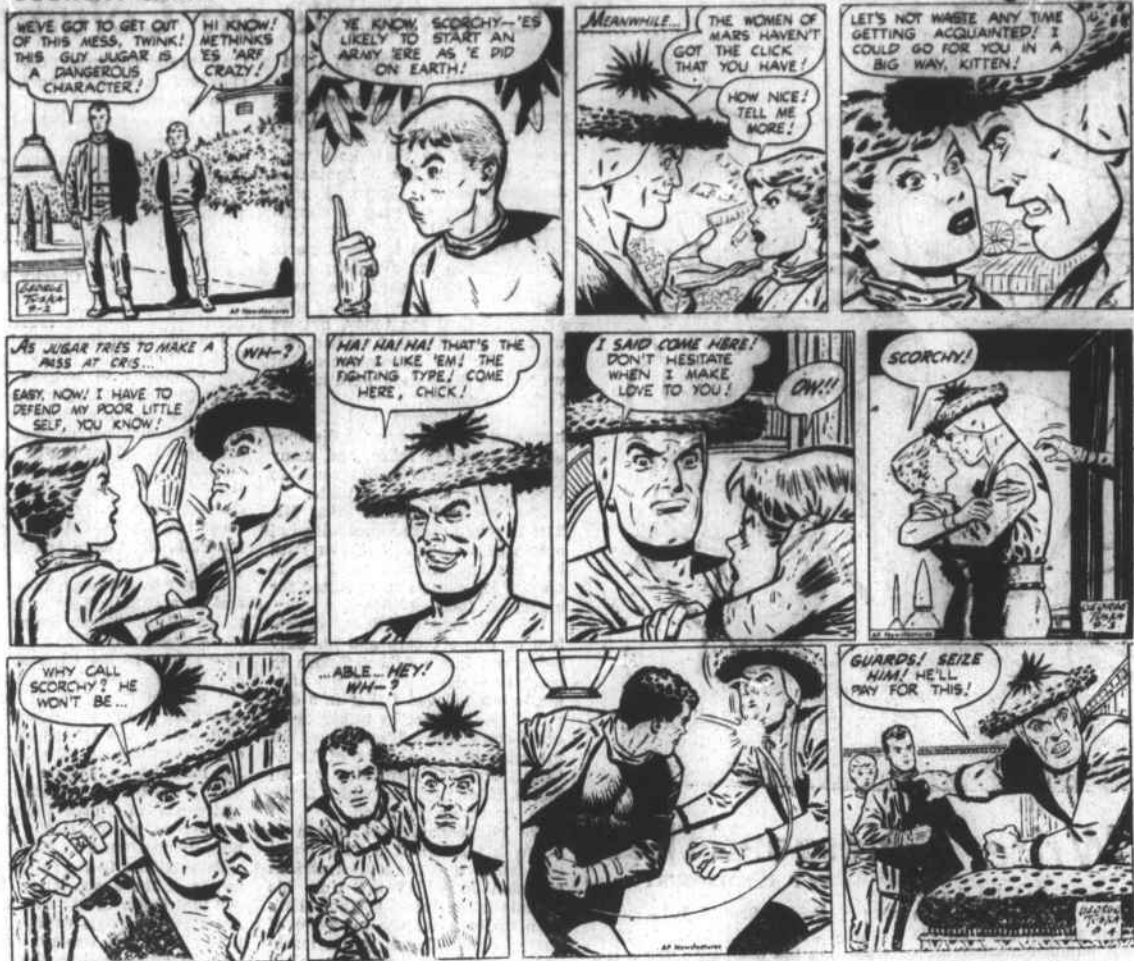

Havelock Post Gets Charter

Havelock — North Carolina's newest American Legion Post, Stipe-Patterson Post No. 169, received its charter last week from state commander, the Rev. Milton B. Faust, during ceremonies which included the Honorable Graham A. Barden, congressman, as principal speaker.

The new post commander, Allen L. Arnold of Havelock in accepting the charter, outlined the aims of the post, stressing the goal of action as a continuing program of community projects with emphasis on youth projects including American Legion Junior Baseball.

State Commander Faust from Spencer, N. C., expressed his pleasure in presenting his first post charter since taking over last May 24. He stressed the importance of living up to this year's Legion slogan, "Service to others."

Seven officers of the new post were sworn in by Commander Faust as he outlined the responsibilities of each. The new officers are Allen L. Arnold, post commander; Ken Tiffany, first vice-commander; M/Sgt. E. Zaczach, second vice-commander; Charles E. Lutz, adjutant; A. H. Uhlman, finance officer; Lieutenant W. C. Croas, service officer; and R. B. Shinkle, sergeant-at-arms.

Father Frank Howard, chaplain, and Lt. Col. T. J. Morgan, legal officer, were unable to be present for the ceremony. The military personnel among the officers were all from the Marine Corps Air Station at Cherry Point.

Congressman Barden, the principal speaker, gave a vigorous talk on the danger of Communism and how the Legion can combat this menace. At one point he compared freedom of the communists in this country to the tolerating of a rattlesnake in the living room of your home. In outlining the tasks facing the Legionnaires, Congressman Barden stated "that this is an opportunity to do some nice things in the community and we all need the opportunity to do nice things in order to bring our average up." He concluded, "Post No. 169 here in Havelock is in the fastest growing, finest small community in North Carolina."

Post Commander Arnold reported progress in locating land adjacent to Havelock for the construction of an American Legion Post and as a site for American Legion Youth activities. He asked that all members function as a committee in the final selection of the land.

Post commanders and American Legion officers from New Bern and Kinston were among the 50 who attended the charter meeting.
