A summary of the drive was re leased today from the office of Major C. A. Speed, director of the Motor Vehicles Department's High-

The anti-speed program co-spon sored by Gov. William B. Umstead from 4,856 during the summer of 1953 to 4,262 for this year.

Greatest reduction reported by any one state was Louisiana's 40.1 per cent cut according to Major Speed. Records of other states ranged from a 72.3 per cent de crease for Mississippi to a 9.9 per cent decrease in deaths for Maine North Carolina reported a 16.0 per

cent decrease.
In all, 15 states showed death reductions this year. They were Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, Delaware, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island, and Verwert.
