Judge Passes Sentence After Brief Hearing

Ronald St. Cyr, a handsome, extremely young looking 20-year-old sailor was sentenced in Superior Court Tuesday afternoon to no less than two years and no more than five years in prison. But the judge amended the sentence Wednesday morning to one year plus a fine of \$500. The money is to be paid to the prosecuting witness, \$250 by Nov. 30 and \$250 prior to the June term of court. Fortyfive dollars in court costs are to be deducted from the \$500.

The sentence means that St. Cyr gets a dishonorable discharge from the Navy and loses his United States citizen-

St. Cyr's attorney, Claud Wheatly, pleaded nolo contendere (charges not contested) to assault with intent to commit rape.

Because of the plea entered, the case did not go to the jury. The trial started at 3:15 p.m.s
