"When TV first came out, many designers asked: 'Should we have a room for TV?' That hasn't been settled, but we have definitely concluded we need a room to get away from TV."

The speaker, John Highland of the American Institute of Architects, thereupon decided that "Any home that doesn't have a family room as well as a living room is incomplete and thereby obsolete."

"The family room," he explained, "should have a slate floor or a vinyl or tile floor, or something like that, so if the youngsters drop anything on it, it won't stain, and when we are entertaining, the floor should be Martini-proof so we don't have to run around behind the guests with little coasters all the time."

You may wonder what it is to become of the living room or "company room," as it seems to be. Not many years ago, it was predicted that the dining room was on its way out—that it cost too much to build for the amount of time it was used. Then dining rooms staged a comeback.

If the living room now goes the way of great-grandmother's front parlor, maybe we'll just revive the old-fashioned "sitting room" with some comfortable rockers.

Firm Displays Tractor Fleet

Now on display at Farm and Home Supply Co. in Beaufort are representative models of an entire new fleet of Super tractors, recently introduced by The Oliver Corporation.

There are five new Oliver tractors in all, including the popular-size general-purpose models—the Super 66, Super 77 and Super 88. Power leader of the group is the Super 99, a 4-5 plow, standard-type

tractor. The Super 55, an all-purpose 2-3 plow model, was announced last September.

"It's the most modern line of farm tractors built," say Alex Graham and Ivey Gillikin, owners of Farm and Supply Co. "The new models are far greater in horsepower, more economical to operate and much sturdier in construction than the tractors they replace. Far Eastern rattan is freely used on cabinet doors and chairs. Leather reflects a simple elegance.

Designer John Wisner emphasized this with a room divider utilizing natural walnut, rattan, pigskin, plastic panels and brass. A rattan frame supports a china cabinet of walnut. Pigskin leather tile is used to decorate sliding doors for the lower credenza. Raffia strands are embedded in plastic sheets used as sliding doors for the upper china cabinet.

Paul McCobb scaled down a hi-fi unit of walnut-finished mahogany to the small home or apartment.

He designed a bookcase-china unit with solid brass frame and mahogany woodwork in sandrift tone.

George Nelson created a full-sized armchair scaled to look small. It is upholstered in a soft green fabric, has wide arm rests and spindle-type legs of satin chrome to give it a light appearance.

Harold M. Schwartz gives a bedroom group a delicate look with an off-white edged headboard framing a pink upholstered insert panel. Contrasting night stands are of natural finish oak. Sliding tambour doors enable easy storage. Matching pink-upholstered oak benches fit under the night stands.

G. McStay Jackson's modernized captain's chair in ebony and maple has a seat on an elevated platform which rests on four springs to enable the sitter to rock.

Indoor lighting has received attention by the National Home Lamp Council. Its group of 22 members displayed a bowl-like prismatic diffuser designed to provide up to 100 per cent more illumination than conventional lamps.

TAX LISTING WILL POSITIVELY END MONDAY, JANUARY 31

10% PENALTY

A 10% penalty will be charged for failure to list taxes during the month of Jan., 1955. THERE WILL BE NO EXTENSION OF TIME BEYOND JAN. 31.

ALL PERSONAL PROPERTY MUST BE LISTED

If you have an automobile, or any personal property such as household furniture, merchandise or any kind of equipment, you MUST list this property for County taxes during the month of January.

POLL TAXES

All men subject to Poll Taxes, as well as all property owners, real or personal, must list to avoid penalties which will positively be charged.

NO LISTING BY PHONE

The listing blank MUST be signed by the owner or an authorized agent. NO LISTINGS WILL BE ACCEPTED BY PHONE.

GRAND JURY ACTION

For failure to list the Board of County Commissioners will present the names of all such persons, firms or corporations to the Grand Jury.
