Morehead Board Considers Bill To Allow Referendum on Schools

The Morehead City Town Board has suggested that a bill be introduced in the legislature which would enable the town to call a referendum on establishing Morehead City or Morehead Township as a school district separate and apart from the county system.

Such a move would require additional tax revenue, but Mayor Dill pointed out that in view of a revaluation of county property and the attendant tax reduction, such might possibly be approved by the people.

He said that in addition to the town's school tax income, the town would get its proportionate share of state funds due the schools.

Dr. T. R. Rice Speaks to Club

Dr. T. R. Rice of the research department, Fish and Wildlife Service, Beaufort, spoke to Morehead City Rotarians at their Thursday night meeting.

Dr. Rice spoke on the different methods of obtaining food and the possibility of increasing the yield of seafood by farming the sea.

He dealt with the possibility of using electronic devices to herd fish into nets, chemically supplying the food fish need, and used laboratory instruments and cultures in tubes to demonstrate the effect of radiation on different objects.

Dr. Rice was introduced by Bill Chalk, chairman of the club service committee.

Some people really think that God loves Americans and nobody else. Do you?

To Blow or Not to Blow, That Was the Question

To blow or not to blow the siren on the Morehead City fire engine on the return from a fire was a major issue at the Morehead City Town Board meeting Thursday night.

Fire Chief Vernon Guthrie told the board he wanted to find out about speed limits for fire engines, whether they should stop at red lights and stop signs and asked, "What are we going to blow if we can't blow our sirens on the way back from the fire? An engine has no horn!"

The matter arose when a state highway patrolman told a fire engine driver one day last week that he couldn't blow his siren if he was headed back to the station — that's what the fire chief told the board.

After lengthy argument, voicing of personal opinion and the mayor's suggestion that the fire engines be equipped with boat horns, the town attorney, George McNeill said speed limits don't apply to

fire engines or policemen answering a call.

He further quoted from statute which permits a fire engine to blow its siren "while in the performance of duty." In his opinion, he said firemen on a call were performing their duty until they got back to the fire station and were ready to answer another call.

He added that they should stop at lights and stop signs on the way home from a fire.

Mayor George Dill told the chief that firemen could blow their sirens, "insofar as reason demands," until a ruling was obtained to the contrary.
