## Husband's Old Shirt Serves As Basis for Pretty Maternity Blouse

Maternity blouse made from an old shirt.

Now for the collar. Just take it off, and stitch around the opened seam at the binding. You can make a square yoke effect with more of the contrasting bias binding and use the same to border the front closing. This gives a nice long-line effect which will draw attention away from your girth, and also disguises the left-to-right buttoning.

For a finishing touch, add a little bow-tie at the neckline, and you have a trim and becoming maternity blouse. One of your husband's old shirts, which has a frayed collar, is perfect for the purpose.

First thing to do is cut off the tail to a becoming length. Put in a neat hem and border with a strip of bias binding.

Even though the sleeves are too long, you can achieve a becoming detail without major alterations. Simply put a couple of rows of binding on the cuff and push up the cuffs to the elbow for a pretty lantern-sleeve silhouette.
