

Joe Wells Pays \$100 Fine, Costs

Judge Lambert Morris Finds Defendant Guilty On Three Charges

Joe Wells was fined \$100 and costs and given a three-month suspended sentence by Judge L. R. Morris in County Recorder's Court Tuesday. He was found guilty of driving drunk, failing to stop at the sound of a siren, and of having in his possession non-taxpaid whisky.

John Burnette was fined \$10 and costs and must pay prior costs that are now due or spend 60 days on the roads. He was found guilty of having no operator's license, having insufficient brakes and failing to stop at a stop sign.

Costs were assessed against William Scott, expired license; George Edward Proffitt, no operator's license, and Gerald C. Barnes, expired registration. A charge of expired license against Barnes was dropped.

Bonds Forfeited
Bonds were forfeited by the following: Parker Abner Guthrie, Junius Thomas Graham, and Raymond Thomas Graham, all charged with speeding; James A. Edwards, assault, George Wooten Christopher, no operator's license, and Marshall Baker, disturbing the peace and public drunkenness.

Marion Willis Walker was assessed costs for allowing an unlicensed person to operate a motor vehicle. Half costs were assessed Lerue Ernest Kelly for failing to yield the right of way, resulting in an accident.

The cases against Helen Marie Brady, charged with no operator's license, and William L. Brady, charged with allowing an unlicensed person to operate a motor vehicle, were left open for future prosecution.

Murder Trial Set First Day

Driver Appeals After Hearing Speeding Penalty

Thomas Kenon was released under \$50 bond and bound over to Superior Court after he was found guilty of speeding by Judge Herbert O. Phillips. Kenon appeared in Morehead City Court Monday. He appealed after hearing the \$25 and costs sentence.

Joe Wells was fined \$50 and costs for hit and run, causing damage to a car.

Robert Franklin Taylor was fined \$10 and costs for speeding and running a stop sign.

Charlie Delford Salter was fined a total of \$50 and costs and given a 30 days' suspended roads sentence when he was found guilty of speeding, running a stop sign, and having no operator's license.

He must be on good behavior for six months and cannot drive a motor vehicle on the streets or highways of the state for six months. Twenty-five dollars of the fine will be remitted to him should he present a valid driver's license to the court within two weeks.

John A. Carlberg and Florence Swindell each were fined \$25 and half costs when they were found guilty of having no operator's licenses. The full fines are to be remitted should they present valid licenses to the court within two weeks.

The first trial cases docketed for Monday are Albert Joshua Wynne, speeding; Moody Lewis, murder, (continued from March term); Rosa Carter, concealing birth; William Edd Watkins and William T. Kinchen, rape; and James Reel and Jane Carol Fair, breaking and entering and larceny.

The case on which most attention will focus will be the trial of Moody Lewis Salter Path, who is being held for the murder of Mrs. E. J. (Tressa) Dolzer.

Lewis, about 50 years of age, has been out under a \$12,500 bond since the latter part of February.

Mrs. Dolzer, 33, was found dead of a shotgun wound at 2:40 Sunday morning, Dec. 19, at Atlantic Beach near the Catholic chapel.

Upon questioning the family and acquaintances of Mrs. Dolzer, Sheriff Hugh Salter and members of his department learned that she had been with Lewis Saturday night. An all-day search for Lewis

took place Sunday. At 6 p.m. that day Lewis turned up at his home at Salter Path. He told officers he had been in the woods.

Found hidden in Lewis's home was a 12-gauge shotgun. Lewis told officers that he and Mrs. Dolzer had an argument about whether he more and that she threatened to shoot him. He said that in an ensuing scuffle on the road near the chapel, the gun went off and she was hit.

Mrs. Dolzer had been employed as a waitress at the Curve Inn, Morehead City.

When his ship docked at Tampico, Mexico, in 1946, Captain Charlie sold the vessel, and returned to Morehead City.

He has been married to the former Manie Lewis of Marshallberg for 41 years, and they have three children, Mrs. Robert Seamon, Charles H. Piner Jr., Augustine Piner, and 12 grandchildren. Captain Charlie and his wife live at 309 N. 7th St., Morehead City.

If anyone sees a spanking bright tug with the name Manie painted on its bow, that's Captain Charlie's pride and joy—a vessel he built right here at home on the shores of Bogue Sound.

In 1906 Captain Charlie started going to sea on sail vessels, which were primarily fishing boats. In 1917 he became a pilot, and has been doing this type of work ever since. He's head pilot for Morehead City harbor.

The pilot, who rates above the captain of a ship, is in charge of taking a vessel in and out of port and sometimes takes charge of the ship up and down the coast.

During World War II, Capt. Charlie was the skipper of a freighter shipping out of Miami into the Caribbean. His most hair-raising adventure came in March 1943 north of Cuba.

The freighter, The Southport, was but one house on the beach, and that structure was a rescue hut maintained by the Coast Guard.

As he worded it, "I have seen Miami grow from a small fishing village into a large city with something like 200,000 population. I can well remember when there

The new business, known as the Piner Dredging Company, is currently engaged in making a fill at Dr. B. F. Royal's camp at Adams Creek. The dredge has been in operation at the camp since Wednesday.

Captain Charlie, who went through seventh grade in Morehead City School, before the lure of the sea became too much for him, says that his other business is going along fine. This is the Carteret Towing Company, Inc., of which he is president.

The Towing company tows ships through the inland waterway and docks and undocks ships. Last Friday, for example, when the buoy tender Conifer went aground in the Inlet, Captain Charlie went out with the tug himself to get the Conifer afloat.

In 1905, at the age of 13, he made his first visit to Florida, and he has been returning there almost every winter since.

Dr. J. Harold Lampe, dean, School of Engineering at State College, was the main speaker at the banquet. Dr. George B. Hoadley, head of the electrical engineering department, was toastmaster.
