take care of the home for him. He was carrying on an affair with this woman in front of his wife, and when the woman's daughter was 14 years of age he started in on her.

"The woman who had been working in the house for him and his wife became suspicious of his attentions to her daughter. One day she went into the kitchen with him in pursuit. The daughter, entering the house through the front door, heard a loud thud in the kitchen, and the man came out and said that the woman would be quiet for a while, but he'd best go back to the kitchen and finish her off.

"Wrap Body in Blanket"
The man did so and then he and the woman's daughter wrapped the body in a blanket and placed the body under the paralyzed wife's bed.

"The man tried several times to bury the body, but he had too much company at the house that day. After placing the body back under his wife's bed, he and the 14-year-old took off.

"They spent a week sleeping under haystacks until finally the youngster said she was going to run away. The man admitted that he thought about killing the young girl but decided instead to give himself up. He was found guilty by the jury of second degree murder."

Negro Preacher Involved
Another case which stands out in the judge's memory, dealt with a Negro preacher in Orange County.

In this particular case the NACP took a strong stand stating that the Negro was going to be railroaded to the gas chamber by a Southern jury.

Judge Hamilton stated that two Negro reporters from the Christian Science Monitor and the Baltimore Sun attended the trial and were shown every courtesy.

After disclosing that the man had committed premeditated murder and then tried to commit suicide, the solicitor asked the jury to bring in a verdict of second degree murder, which they did.

Preacher Admits Crime
The preacher admitted on the stand that though happily married he had been carrying on affairs with his choir leader and the missionary society president. He stated that he had decided to end the affairs by shooting the choir leader and then killing himself.

During a fond embrace he did kill the choir leader, but the different ways he chose couldn't kill him. As a matter of fact he was brought into court that day all bandaged up since his final attempt at self destruction had been by using a straight razor to cut his throat.

The preacher was sentenced to 30 years in prison, where he died.

He was up for parole, but the authorities deemed that he had lost his mind while in prison and refused the parole.

These three cases stood out in his mind, the judge said, because they were written up so extensively.

Just Completed Tour
The judge, just recently returned from a tour of 14 different countries, including the Holy Land, is married to Marie Long, a Morehead City native, and has one son, Luther Jr., and a daughter, Mrs. Rebecca Vickers, and four grandchildren.

Accompanying him on the tour was his wife. Countries they visited included France, Italy, Spain, Greece, Turkey, Egypt, Tunisia, Syria, Israel and Lebanon.

They started their tour in March and returned to the United States on June 11.

Burgaw, representing agriculture; Mrs. Carl Bishop, representing textiles; J. N. Vann, Asheville, representing lumber and timber; H. Grady Farthing, Boone, representing wildlife.

Scott B. Berkeley, Goldsboro, mayor of Goldsboro, representing municipalities; E. C. Hubbard, executive secretary of the committee; Raleigh; W. R. Clary, chief of stream study section, Raleigh, and W. E. Long Jr., chief of stream pollution control section.

Senator Whitfield acted as chairman for the hearing. Mr. Hubbard explained the committee's purpose in setting up sanitation regulations.

The committee said its final recommendations on classifications would be available by the end of the year. After the recommendations are adopted, the sanitation regulations will be enforced as law.

The committee likened itself to a zoning commission in that the waters, ratings may be changed following adoption of the classifications, provided the interested parties send a brief to the committee explaining need for a change.

The program as set forth by the committee will cost the people of North Carolina money, Mr. Hubbard said, but he also stated that the committee would do everything in its power not to hamper anyone from continuing in business.

As for the fisheries of this area, Mr. Hubbard said that it was up to the operators to keep waste out of the waters by a system of good housekeeping.

Where waste materials get into the water, Mr. Hubbard said, the operators will have to treat the waters to comply with sanitation regulations.

Mr. Potter stated that insofar as he was concerned the shellfish, such as oysters, that came out of "polluted waters" were just as palatable as those from unpolluted waters.

Assistant Chief Issues Citations over Weekend

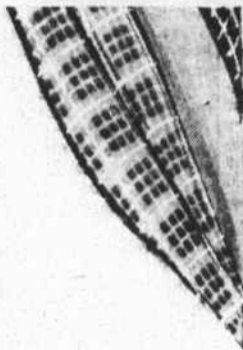
Four persons were apprehended over the weekend by Assistant Chief of Police Carlton Garnier.

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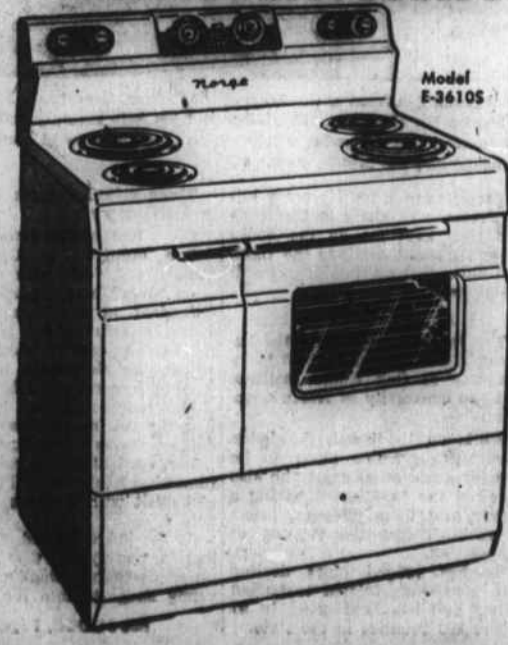

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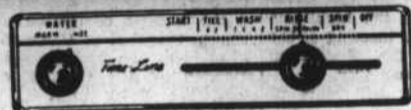
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
