Cases against Earl Noe Jr., Beaufort, charged with failing to yield the right of way, and Robert Primrose Gooding, route 1, Beaufort, charged with failing to give the proper hand signal, were continued until Aug. 18 in County Recorder's Court yesterday morning.

Controls Two Roads
The state controls two railroad companies—the A&NC and the North Carolina Railroad Company. The Governor recently had John Motley Morehead of New York, a North Carolina native and retired industrialist, elected president of the North Carolina Railroad.

Mr. Morehead, a Republican, is a grandson of the John Motley Morehead, whose marble bust stands in the State Capitol rotunda. The first John Motley Morehead served two terms as governor and has been called the father of the North Carolina railroad.

The A&NC owns the tracks between Goldsboro and Morehead City. The NCRR owns the tracks between Goldsboro and Charlotte. The A&NC's tracks are leased to a private stock corporation, the Atlantic and East Carolina Railroad. The NCRR's tracks are leased to the Southern Railway.

The Southern now is seeking permission from the Interstate Commerce Commission to acquire control of the A&EC.

Majority Interest
The state owns 72 per cent, or 12,666 shares of the A&NC stock. The Norfolk Southern owns 15 per cent, or 2,605 shares. Craven County owns 1,293 shares. The re-

Mack Wade of the Beaufort Police Department was the investigating officer. Whitley was driving a 1941 Chevrolet ton-and-a-half truck. No damage was done to his truck.
