Pfc. Carl Lewis Takes Part in River Crossing

Augsburg, Germany—Army Pfc. Carl Lewis, whose wife, Marlene, lives on route 1 Pascagoula, Miss., recently took part in river crossing exercises in southern Germany.

The first troops went over in boats under a smoke screen. They were followed by infantry soldiers who crossed on a pontoon foot bridge, built under simulated combat conditions.

Private First Class Lewis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Lewis Jr., route 1 Beaufort, is an infantryman in Company B of the 5th Infantry Division's 10th Regiment. He arrived in Europe in April of this year.

A former employe of F. B. Walker and Sons, Pascagoula, Lewis entered the Army in 1954 and completed basic training at Fort Jackson, S. C.

1st Div., Germany — Specialist Third Class Marvin M. Meadows, whose wife, Fernie, lives at Stella, is scheduled to leave Germany for the U. S. in September as part of Operation Gyroscope, the Army's

new unit rotation plan. Specialist Meadows' unit, the 1st Infantry Division, is being replaced in Europe by the 10th Infantry Division. The two divisions are the first units to take part in the transfer plan.

Meadows, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey G. Meadows, Maysville, is a cannoner in Battery B of the division's 5th Field Artillery Battalion. He entered the Army in December 1953 and arrived overseas in May 1954.

The 22-year-old soldier attended Maysville High School.

The sons of Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Perry, Beaufort RFD, got together Tuesday, Aug. 23, in Germany. Cpl. William H. Perry, stationed near Darmstadt, Germany, was surprised when his brother, Private James A. Perry visited him.

James, who is with an engineer battalion stationed near Paris, is due to leave for this country this month. He has been overseas for the past 18 months. William is serving with a signal battalion.
