J. T. Brown Pays \$35 Fine, Costs

J. T. Brown was fined \$35 and costs in Morehead City Recorder's Court Tuesday morning by Judge Herbert O. Phillips. Brown pled guilty to having no operator's license and speeding.

Should he present a valid license to the court within two weeks, \$25 of the fine will be remitted.

Farm Bureau Valiantly Strikes for 400 Mark

Although the farmers have been hard hit with hurricanes, the County Farm Bureau hopes to meet its goal of 400 members. C. N. Stroud, Morehead City, membership chairman, reminds farmers that through Farm Bureau action farmers have been saved thousands of dollars in taxes and assessments.

Twenty-six Farm Bureau membership solicitors attended the meeting last Friday night at Captain Bill's Restaurant, Morehead City, and heard the state Farm Bureau president, Alonzo Edwards.

Mr. Edwards likened the Farm Bureau to a team. If everybody either plays or helps support the team, he pointed out, the farmer can't help but win.

Percentage Small
Today only 13 per cent of the nation's population are engaged in farming, as compared with 90 to 95 per cent when this country was new. This modern-day small percentage, he said, must unite for self-preservation, because it no longer holds the balance of power through individual votes.

"We're living today," he said, "in a regulated economy. Legislation has provided a dollar an hour minimum wage for labor and industries are subsidized with tariff regulations." The farmer too, he added, must take action to see that he is not forgotten among the flood of concessions to other groups.

The 71,000 farmers in this state should strengthen their bonds and increase resources to protect their interests, the speaker declared.

What Bureau Has Done
Accomplishments of the Farm Bureau during the past year were listed.

1. The Farm Bureau kept a tax off feed, seed and fertilizer during the 1955 session of the legislature which meant a saving to the farmer of millions of dollars.

2. A tax on cigarettes was blocked.

3. Legislation to improve milk and new marketing laws were obtained as a measure against price wars.

4. By knocking out a tax on potato a saving of a million and a half dollars to the farmers was effected.

Mr. Edwards, in reply to the charge that the Farm Bureau fights only for the tobacco farmer, said that for every 50 cents spent for the tobacco farmer, \$10 is spent for the vegetable grower.

The speaker emphasized the need for cooperative markets, to furnish better outlets for truck

produce. He also remarked that 325 million pounds of tobacco over the amount buyers were willing to take, had been produced this year. "In that line, the Farm Bureau has a terrific task to perform," the speaker declared.

Farm Wives Attend
Several farm wives attended the meeting and among the speakers was Mrs. Floy Garner, home agent. There is a possibility that a Farm Bureau auxiliary may be organized.

Other speakers were Nathan Garner and Floyd Garner, Newport; Lionel Pelletier, Stella; George Roberts, vocational teacher from Greene County, who was born near Newport, and R. M. Williams, county agent.

Milton Truckner, Pelletier, County Farm Bureau president, presided.
