Eagles Win Fourth Straight Contest Tuesday Afternoon, Down Dixon 4-3

The Morehead City Eagles won their fourth straight game Tuesday afternoon at the home diamond as they eked out a 4-3 decision over Dixon.

The game was a thriller with Dixon scoring a pair in the top of the first and the Eagles retaliating with four markers on but one hit in the bottom of the first.

Dixon scored its third run in the top of the fifth. Jerry Pittman started on the hill for the Eagles but had to relinquish the mound duties to Bradley McIntosh in the second frame when Jerry started nursing a blister on the finger of his pitching hand.

Rawls Nicholson started on the hill for the visitors and he was relieved by Bill Smith in the initial frame when he couldn't get anyone out.

The game started off on a thrilling note as Paul Raynor led off with a homerun over the right field wall. Ernest Antinori singled into right, went to second on a blooper to center by Dale Padgett.

Both men advanced on wild pitches and then Antinori scored as pitcher Pittman uncorked his second wild pitch.

In the bottom of the first Earl Wade dropped a Texas Leaguer into center and moved to third as Jimmy Parker and Ken Putnam drew walks. Smith relieved Nicholson with a count of 3-0 on Putnam.

Wade Scores Smith wild-pitched Wade home with Parker moving to third and Putnam to second. Ron Howland walked to load the bases once again.

Parker scored as the shortstop booted McIntosh's grounder, and the bases remained loaded. Pittman struck out, and Raymond Earl Willis followed suit.

Kent Brown hit one that went through the second baseman's legs for a two-run error as Putnam and Howland scored. Danny O'Neal struck out to end the inning.

In the fifth I. Padgett singled to center and moved to second on an error. Padgett scored as Raynor doubled into left.

He moved to third as Bill Smith grounded out third to first. With Nicholson at bat Padgett tried to steal home but was cut down, McIntosh to Glancy.

Raynor was the big hitter in the ball game with 3-3 for Dixon, as teammate D. Padgett had 2-3. I. Padgett had 1-2, and Antinori had 1-3.
