The sessions took place at night. On Monday the students saw films at the fire station and raised ladders at Morehead City School. Tuesday night was a chalk session at the Morehead City fire station and training movies were shown.

Classes were again conducted Wednesday night at Morehead City and then the firemen went to Newport where they used fog to put out a fire in the old Newport jail.

Last night the firemen went to Beaufort, laid hose, pumped water and practiced ladder raising at the school.

House Committee Okays Port Fund

In a telegram to Mayor George Dill, Morehead City, Wednesday, Congressman Graham Barden announced that the House Public Works committee had approved a bill appropriating funds for improvement of Morehead City harbor.

Congressman Barden said the House will probably take favorable action on the bill within the next two weeks.

Mayor Dill said that this means that the actual appropriation will be sought, and probably approved, in the next session of Congress.

The mayor recently testified in favor of the improvement before a House subcommittee in Washington.

He said it was not expected that the funds would be appropriated in this session of Congress.

The bill to which the public works committee gave approval provides for \$1,197,000 to enlarge the Morehead City turning basin and deepen the channel to 35 feet, a project long sought by the state port and Morehead City.

Included in the bill also is an authorization for funds to eradicate water hyacinths in North Carolina and eight other states. The hyacinths grow in abundance in certain streams, endangering animal life and navigation.

State Considers Application For Cedar Island Car Ferry

A vital link in the proposed all-seashore highway along the North Carolina coast will come into being if the State Utilities Commission approves an application before it for a car ferry from Cedar Island to Ocracoke.

The application to operate the ferry has been filed by A. W. Daniels, a native Cedar Islander, now a resident of Charlotte.

The ferry would carry passengers, baggage, automobiles, trucks and light express. It would operate from Cedar Island "in the vicinity of" the end of Highway 70, across Cedar Island Bay, Core Sound, and Pamlico Sound to Ocracoke.

The ferry would dock near the end of Highway 158 on Ocracoke. The highway is now under construction.

Establishment of the ferry would permit travel by automobile from Elizabeth City south to Kitty Hawk, Nags Head, through the Cape Hatteras Seashore Park, over Ocracoke Island, and through eastern Carteret County to Beaufort and Morehead City.

A hearing on establishment of the ferry will be held by the State Utilities Commission at Morehead City at 10 a.m. July 20, in the municipal building.

Protests, if any, should be filed with the State Utilities Commission prior to that date.

Mr. Daniels, who owns a home on Cedar Island and is a frequent visitor to the county, is owner and manager of the Charlotte Fish and Oyster Co.

Defendant Pays \$400 Fine, Gets Suspended Terms

Ernest Clyde Lowe drew two six-month suspended sentences in Morehead City Recorder's Court Monday, was ordered to pay a total fine of \$400 and stay on good behavior two years.

He pleaded guilty to driving without a license, driving while drunk (second offense) and driving after his license was revoked.

A jury trial was requested in the case of Durwood Lee Chadwick, charged with careless and reckless driving and operation of a car while drunk. Judge Herbert Phillips set Chadwick's bond, for appearance in Superior Court, at \$200.

Harrison Horton drew a 30-day suspended sentence. He was found guilty of being drunk and disorderly, destroying property, and assaulting his wife, Mabel, and 17-month-old baby April 6.

He was told to stay on good behavior one year, provide adequate support for his wife and children and pay court costs.

Fails to Appear
Ruth Jean Connors failed to appear to answer to a charge of no operator's license. Her bond was forfeited and case set again for July 9 when judgment will be made.

The judge recommended that Leamon Wynn, charged with assaulting Cecil Best with a hoe, be given mental treatment and the case was removed from the docket.

Prayer for judgment was continued indefinitely in the case of Kenneth Tootle, charged with assaulting Frank Tootle with a knife.

Costs Levied
Costs were levied against Lawrence W. Watson, who pleaded guilty to being drunk on the highway, and against James McLaughlin, who pleaded guilty to public drunkenness.

R. M. Taylor pleaded guilty to indecent exposure, paid \$10 and costs and was ordered to remain on good behavior two years. Claude Russell Johnson was found not guilty on a charge of speeding, careless and reckless driving.

Architects Work On Hospital Wing

D. E. Taylor, a trustee of the Taylor Foundation, announced yesterday at West Palm Beach, Fla., that architects are working on plans for a new wing for the Sea Level Community Hospital.

Mr. Taylor said that no details on the proposed construction are available at present but they probably would be ready soon.

The addition is being considered in order to improve the hospital services to residents of the eastern part of the county. The hospital, built by the Taylor Foundation, has been operating since Nov. 21, 1953.

County Seeks \$9,000 to Battle Mosquitoes

A. D. Fulford, county sanitarian, will send off today an application for \$9,000 for mosquito control funds. The \$9,000 is being requested through the Federal Civil Defense Administration which has allotted \$100,000 to North Carolina for mosquito control.

Mr. Fulford said that included in the application will be a request for another truck and fogging machine. This will mean that the county will have two trucks and foggers, one for the eastern part of the county and one for the west.

None of the money, Mr. Fulford said, can be used for ditching, drainage, or spraying from the air. The funds will be used, in addition for a truck and fogging machine, for DDT, gasoline, and other operation needs.

Twenty counties are eligible to participate in the \$100,000 mosquito control program. Mr. Fulford said there is no guarantee that Carteret will get \$9,000, but that amount is being asked for.

Conferring with Mr. Fulford yesterday on filing the application, was Sidney H. Ustry, state consultant on mosquito control.

JC's Discuss Aero Club Tour

Beaufort Jaycees, at their meeting Monday night at the Scout Building, discussed plans for entertaining the North Carolina Aero Club in July.

One hundred persons and approximately 45 planes are expected in Beaufort on a weekend flying tour. Jesse Taylor is Jaycee chairman in charge of entertaining the aviation enthusiasts.

During the business session the Jaycees also decided to rent the building to the Junior Woman's Club, should the women want to use it.

They agreed to act too as agents for a lawn-keeping service, the Jaycees to be paid a commission on the jobs they procure. Joe Long was made chairman of the project.

Plans for tonight's beauty pageant were announced by Ralph Albares, chairman.

Budget Officials Visit Morehead

Members of the State's Advisory Budget Commission visited the Morehead City port, the commercial fisheries building and the Institute of Fisheries Research, University of North Carolina, at Morehead City Wednesday.

They were gathering information necessary for drawing up the budget for the 1957-58 biennium. Members of the House committee are Kemp Doughton, Sparta; LeRoy Martin, Raleigh; Nelson Woodson, Salisbury; Carl Venters, Jacksonville; and J. C. Eagles Jr., Wilson.

Richard Marr, executive director of the state ports; Mayor George Dill, Morehead City; D. G. Bell, Carteret assemblyman; Mrs. Joe Eagles, and Lynn Nisbet, columnist.

The group had lunch aboard the state boat, Cape Hatteras. C. G. Holland, commercial fisheries commissioner, said the budget officials expressed interest in the oyster rehabilitation program and believe an increase in appropriations would be desirable.

Three Farmers Sign Up In Soil Bank Program

By noon yesterday three farmers had signed up to participate in the soil bank program, according to B. J. May, ASC manager.

More are expected to come under the program by the 5 p.m. deadline today.

Two of the three farmers did not plant their allotments, 1.7 acres and 2.9 acres, and the third, Mr. May said, is planning to plow under his 1.7 acres. This means a total of 6.3 acres have been "put in the bank."

Sixteen farmers attended the meeting at the courthouse Wednesday night to hear the soil bank program explained. R. M. Williams, county agent, told the farmers, "This program is set up to help you and I hope you get all you can out of it."

Mr. May explained what farmers must do to qualify as a soil banker. Tobacco must be plowed under tomorrow. That's why farmers must sign up by 5 today. They cannot participate in the program unless they first notify the ASC office in the postoffice building, Beaufort.

Any farmer who has already started to harvest his tobacco is not eligible, Mr. May pointed out.

Every-Member Canvass Will Start Next Week To Raise Funds

If sufficient funds are available, St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, Morehead City, will proceed with plans to build a parish house. Cost of the parish house is estimated at \$60,000.

Plans for an every-member canvass next week were made at a covered dish congregational supper Tuesday night at the recreation building, Morehead City. In charge of the canvass will be Phillip Ball and Edgar Swann.

After it is determined what amounts members will pledge for parish house construction, the decision will be made on letting contracts.

Richard McClain, senior warden, presided at the congregational meeting. Mr. McClain and Stanley Woodland spoke on the need for a parish house. W. W. Patrick presented the proposed plan; Mrs. George Wallace, chairman of the planning committee, spoke on cost and methods of raising the money; E. W. Olschner spoke on how construction costs would affect the church budget; and R. H. Dowdy, building fund treasurer, gave a report on the funds on hand.

Seventy-five persons attended. Rector of St. Andrew's is the Rev. E. Guthrie Brown, who could not attend the meeting because of illness.
