Sheriff Hugh Salter said that Boyette has admitted that he was with the girl Friday night.

Boyette, who has lived in More-head City the past six years, spent his early life at Pink Hill and at the Falcon orphanage between Dunn and Fayetteville. He said that he has had about seven years

of schooling.

According to his story, he was with Jerry Willis, Crab Point, Friday afternoon. They were sitting in Willis's car on Arendell Street, drinking whisky, when the 13-year-old girl and her older sister, 16,



At a hearing on the channel bass issue Saturday at the commercial fisheries building, the committee told sportsmen it would recom-mend that a limit of two bass per

The fish would have to be 32 inches or longer, to be used for human consumption only and not sold commercially or shipped out of the state. The limit of two daily would apply to both sports and commercial fishermen.

Based on a suggested regulation by the U.S. Marine Fisheries Commission, the legal size for channel bass would be 14 to 32 inches, on which there would be no limit as
