Crossword Puzzle

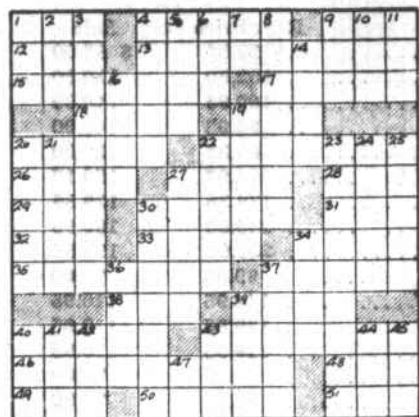

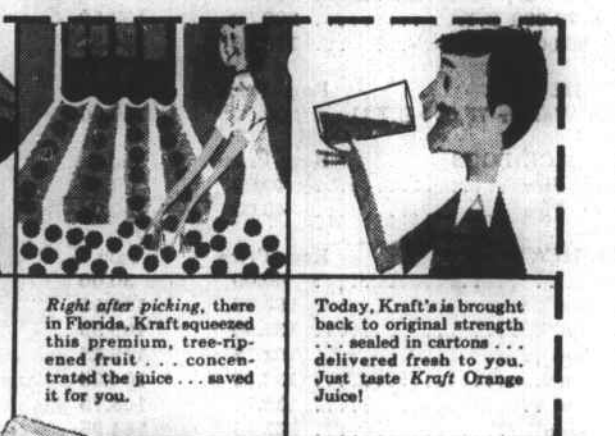
