**Negro Woman Gets Jail Term for Shoplifting**

Evelyn Pinkney, Beaufort Negro, was sentenced to two years in prison Thursday in county recorder's court. Judge Lambert Morris found her guilty of shoplifting.

After hearing testimony proving she had stolen items from various stores in Beaufort, Judge Morris ruled that she had also broken terms of a suspended sentence and invoked that term to run at the same time as the new sentence.

Four cases were sent up to superior court. William Earl Chapman waived a preliminary hearing and was bound over under a \$1,000 bond. He was charged with hit and run.

Judge Morris found probable cause in the case of William B. Lewis, Carl Locklear and Lester Knudson, all charged with breaking, entering and larceny. The three were bound over to superior court for a jury trial.

**Requests Jury Trial**

Harold Mobley, also charged with breaking, entering and larceny, was bound over to superior court under a \$300 bond. Leo Law-

rence, charged with assault, requested a jury trial and posted a \$100 bond.

Gilbert M. Russell, convicted of driving drunk for the second time, was charged \$200 plus court costs. Wesley Brown was ordered to pay costs plus a \$100 fine for his first drunken driving conviction.

Leroy Pickett was fined a similar amount for careless and reckless driving. Jacob Bill Bonknight was fined \$50 and ordered to pay costs for aiding and abetting in careless and reckless driving.

Also getting a fine of \$100 plus costs was Waddell Gillikin, convicted of careless and reckless driving.

Three defendants were ordered to pay fines of \$25 plus costs. They were E. T. Thomas, fighting and possession of a concealed weapon; Harry G. Stewart, speeding 75; and Hugh F. Sager, careless and reckless driving and hit and run.

**Two Pass Bad Checks**

Two defendants were convicted of passing bad checks. They were Dean Chatlos and Catherine Rey-

olds. Each had to honor his check and pay court costs.

Two defendants paid costs. They were Ammie Willis, failing to comply with a court order; and Merle A. Dixon, improper muffler and speeding.

The judge ruled that two defendants were the victims of malicious prosecution. In each case the prosecuting witness was ordered to pay court costs.

The defendants were Eugene Traxler and R. L. Duke, both charged with assault.
