The hearing will start at 9:30 a.m., in the Department Auditorium, between 12th and 14th Streets on Constitution Avenue NW, Washington, D. C.

Copies of the agenda, which contain the specific changes proposed are available in the Merchant Marine Safety Office, Room 209, Post-office Building, Norfolk, Va.

Written comments on the proposed regulations containing constructive criticisms, suggestions, or views are welcomed. It is essential, though, that each comment regarding a section or paragraph of the proposed regulations shall be submitted on a prepared form available at the Merchant Marine Safety Office.

Each person who desires to submit written comments should submit them so that they will be received before April 23, 1959, by the Commandant, US Coast Guard Headquarters, Washington 25, D. C.
