soluable in water, but following application, it moves into the sur-face layer of the soil. As the roots of weeds and grass grow down. they accumulate enough of the chemical to cause death. The farm agent warns farmers to be on the lookout in irish potato

fields for the European corn borer moth. The moth lays eggs, then the larvae feed on the leaves and stems of the potato plant. That is when the plants should

be sprayed or dusted with DDT, which also kills the potato beetle.






