Brief talks were made by Charlie Parker, head of the state advertising division, C&D; Mayor A. B. Cooper, Atlantic Beach; George Carter, tour director; Kays Gerry, Charlotte Observer, and Roy Thompson of the Winston-Salem Journal.

Michael Taft, manager of the hotel, and J. A. DuBois, manager of the Morehead City chamber of commerce, were recognized. J. M. Davis, president of the chamber,

presented the travel awards. Recognized also were C. G. Holland, state fisheries commissioner, and his men who piloted the travelers on the sea cruise: Roma Salter, Wiley Mason and W. S. Goodwin.

He also suggested that cost accounting methods be used to determine changing financial costs and needs of the various schools so that, in subsequent months, the school authorities, the county commissioners and the public as well would be in better position to formulate school improvement plans.

He touched on the county's growing taxable wealth, especially on Atlantic Beach, at which point commissioner Skinner Chalk stated that not only was another Bogue Sound bridge badly needed, but would probably pay for itself in two years by indirectly increasing the value of taxable real estate.

R. M. Williams, county farm agent, stated that this year at least 80 per cent of all cattle in the county must be tested for traces of tuberculosis and that Milton J. Tillery, state department of agriculture veterinarian, needed a helper. Mr. Williams' request for funds were granted to the extent of \$180.

Mr. Williams was the first to present his department's budget which was accepted tentatively.

E. O. Moore's 1958 and prior years' tax collections for April were commended by the commissioners. The 1958 levy collections in April alone were \$22,506.05. Added to this were collections of \$947.73 for prior years accounted for by Mr. Moore's deputy, E. L. Brinson. To date 89.28 per cent of the 1958 levy has been collected.

Mrs. W. L. Woodard and Mrs. J. O. Barbour Jr., representing the county library, requested \$690.00 to re-roof the library building at Pollock and Broad Streets, Beaufort. The commissioners took that matter under advisement.

John Humphrey, state highway department district engineer, was present to assist the commissioners in various requests for road paving, and drainage problems. The board will request the highway department to pave a one mile road from highway 70 near Beaufort to Jones Village and then back to highway 70.

It will also recommend paving of Hibb's Road, a 3.8 mile stretch from Newport to highway 24.

Chemical Kills Corn Field Weeds

R. M. Williams, county farm agent, announces that farmers can see a grass and weed control demonstration in a corn field on Ralph Wilkins' farm, east of Beaufort. The farm agent says "very effective results" have been obtained with a new chemical.

The chemical is practically insoluble in water, but following application, it moves into the surface layer of the soil. As the roots of weeds and grass grow down, they accumulate enough of the chemical to cause death.

The farm agent warns farmers to be on the lookout in Irish potato fields for the European corn borer moth. The moth lays eggs, then the larvae feed on the leaves and stems of the potato plant.

That is when the plants should be sprayed or dusted with DDT, which also kills the potato beetle.
